TRACK CONSTRUCTION The big news at the depot over the last quarter has been the laying of track in front of the building. The track materials arrived on April 2; they were purchased from Troutman Enterprises of Seal Beach at a cost of \$7,200. Saturday, May 11 was our first big track work day. Volunteers on the track gang included Gene Allen, Gene Boswell, Gary and Elmer Coombs, John and Ed Lebeck, Ralph, Scott and Steve Moore, Phyllis Olsen, Gene Rantanen, and Mark Sheckherd. Other helpers on the day were George Adams, Betty Coombs, Paul Heuston, Jason Lebeck, and Charlotte Moore.

Seth Hammond of Specialty Crane and Rigging, Gary Van Horne, and Steve Tilford assisted by generously donating the use of heavy equipment for moving the massive rails. Vince Espinosa from the Southern Pacific Transportation Co and Ernest Estes from the Santa Maria Valley

Railroad have helped us out with technical advice and tools.

The ties and rails are now in position and a second work day has been planned to drive spikes on June 15. \$2000 is still needed to complete the ballasting of the track.

TICKETS AVAILABLE HERE! The last passenger train tickets were sold at Goleta Depot 20 years ago, in May 1965, when the local milk train made its final runs through the area. There was a short-lived jump in passenger numbers at that time, as rail fans and classes from Montecito

Nursery School, Adams School, and others, took a final opportunity to flag the local.

Well, the trains don't stop at Goleta Depot any more, but in our efforts to restore as much of the depot's former way of life as possible, we have been successful in acquiring distribution point status so that railroad passenger tickets can again be purchased at Goleta Depot. In addition to Amtrak tickets, we can also offer passage on international lines, including VIA (Canadian rail), Eurail, and others. Further good news is that our commission from sales will be used for further enhancements to the depot museum.

Effective immediately, tickets may be purchased or reservations made, by phone or in person, during our regular business hours, Monday-Friday, 1 to 5 p.m., by contacting Gary Coombs. No

ticket business will be conducted during Saturday museum hours.

INSTITUTE CLOSED FOR VACATION The Institute for American Research office will be closed June 22-30. However, the railroad museum will remain open for its regular hours: Monday-Saturday 1-4.

NEW MUSEUM EXHIBITS Two new permanent exhibits were opened in the Goleta Depot Railroad Museum during the first week in June. One exhibit, entitled "The Streetcars of Old Santa Barbara," is based on our recent publication, "Mule Car and Trolley: The Story of The Santa Barbara Street Railway," by Bill Everett and Gary Coombs. The exhibit is built around the three main periods of city streetcar history: (i) Mule car era; (ii) Narrow-gauge electric streetcars or "trolleys"; and (iii) Standard-gauge electric cars. The display incorporates detailed scale car models built by Bill Everett, route maps, and a number of rare, historical photographs, including

many from the book. The exhibit is located in the museum's main exhibit room, the old passenger waiting room. The beautiful oak case was constructed by our master carpenter, Ralph Moore.

The other new exhibit deals with the Goleta Depot freight scale. It consists of the restored upper portion of the scale, plus interpretive material. The Goleta Valley Chamber of Commerce was kind enough to allow us to place the exhibit at the entrance to their office, within a few feet of the scale's original location. Most of the massive floor scale was intact at the time we acquired the building, but the brass balance arm and iron weights had been removed, probably at about the time that the depot was closed in the early '70s. Through the cooperation of Superintendent G.R. Fetty and station agent Dick Reed, the Southern Pacific Transportation Co. donated to the museum an identical balance arm and set of weights from the Oxnard depot, so that we could complete this interesting display.

DEPOT FLYER Depot Friends are sure to appreciate our new flyer, a copy of which accompanies this newsletter. The printing of the flyer was paid for by our good friends at the Goleta Valley Chamber of Commerce from bed tax monies.
