STERLING AWARD At the annual dinner, we introduced a new award for voluntary service to the Institute for American Research. The award is called the "Sterling Award," and we plan to give one each year to a person who has made an extraordinary contribution to the Institute and its programs.

The award takes the form of a sterling silver pin, with the depot depicted in the center and surrounded by a black field with the word "Goleta." A selection committee for the award consists of the president of the Institute board of directors, the executive director, and the chairman of the Goleta Depot committee.

The recipient of the first Sterling Award was Ray Baird, who has been an active member of the Goleta Depot Committee since its inception. The presentation was made by Institute president Paul Heuston, who said about Ray:

"For nearly two years, in those incredibly busy days leading up to the landmark dedication in 1982, this man was on constant call, day and night, to discuss plans, instruct volunteers, order materials, answer questions, meet with officials, and report on progress.

"And, when the depot project faced impossible budgetary constraints, he joined in the fund-raising effort, successfully finding donations of building supplies and labor, which saved the project thousands of dollars.

"Working under conditions that were far from ideal, with difficult deadlines and heart-breaking setbacks, he stayed with the project when others withdrew, always keeping the good of the project at heart, ever willing to do whatever was needed to see that the job got done and, through it all, maintaining the cheerful disposition which those close to him know so well."

We can only hope that future Sterling Award winners will be as deserving as Ray!

VOLUNTEER SERVICE RECOGNIZED Three other awards for distinguished service to the Goleta Depot Railroad Museum were presented at the annual dinner. These were given to Bill Everett, for donating his authorship in the publication of Mule Car and Trolley; to Erbie Daw, for Banner Construction's contribution of the preparatory grading work for the track project; and to Eugene Boswell, for dedicating many long hours to the depot, serving as museum docent, curator, and painter-gardener-handyman.

park are offered on the first and second Sundays of each month, from 11-3. There is a \$1 admission charge.
