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STEAM TRAIN TRACK PLANNED The rides on the little steam train were such a terrific success on Depot Day '85 that the Depot Committee has decided to go ahead with plans for a longer, regular route for the track. Since the steam railroad will only be used a few times each year, the track will not be laid on a permanent basis. Instead, it will be put down immediately before a run day, and dismantled after the

event. To facilitate this operation, we will be constructing special "snap-track" and preparing a permanent roadbed for the track.

Gene Allen has designed the new route, which runs 3/4 of the way around the depot, beginning at a turning-Y behind the building, traveling around the northern end of the depot, and ending at a balloon loop in front of the building to the south. This route will involve about 1500 feet of track and will allow a round-trip ride of more than 1/3 mile. Plans for the railroad are available for viewing at the Institute office.

Costs of the project have been set at \$4500. Persons wishing to make a tax-deductible contribution to the (Little) Track Fund may use the form which accompanies this newsletter.

SACRAMENTO TRIP UPDATE The details of our rail trip to Sacramento and the railroad museum have now been finalized. We will be leaving on Thursday, May 8 at noon, and returning on Sunday, May 11 at 4 p.m. As on our last excursion, we will be staying at the Vagabond Inn, which is adjacent to the AMTRAK station, museum, and Sacramento Old Town.

Bev worked for the Canadian National Railway in the early 1950s, serving as a station agent, train dispatcher, and telegrapher. He came to work for the S.P. in 1956, where he worked in the Beaumont CTC dispatcher's office, as a relief station agent from Santa Barbara to Calexico, and as a wire chief in Indio and Santa Barbara. He left railroad work in 1961, when he opened his own business in Santa Barbara.

You can meet Bev by visiting the museum on the fourth Saturday of any month. Be sure to ask him for a demonstration of the telegraph key!

Bev replaces Perry and Bonnie Adams, who deserve a big round of applause for all of their hard work during 1985 in helping to get our agents program off the ground. The museum is in need of another agent-trainee, to work once every three months. The job involves volunteering 3-1/2 hours on a Saturday afternoon.
