Yes, Virginia, There Is A San Diego Train

At long last, the extended San Diegan service to Santa Barbara is ready to go. The inaugural run will be Sunday, June 26, and the museum is organizing a large

group excursion for that first day.

Seats are still available and may be reserved by calling the museum office (964-3540). The cost is \$45 for adults (including a \$3 donation to the museum) and \$21 for children under 12. Departure is at 7:45 a.m., with a 10:10 p.m. return. There are over three hours schedule time in San Diego, with the Amtrak station convenient to downtown and the waterfront.

Museum Endowment Announced

Dr. and Mrs. Richard Thomas have established an endowment for the museum, it was announced at the Annual Dinner. Speaking for the Board of Directors, Jon Bartel said that the Thomases' founding gift consisted of two live-steam locomotives, which will be sold. One of the engines has been appraised at over \$30,000.

In making their gift, the Thomases wrote, "It gives us a great deal of pleasure to create the Richard and Georgia Thomas Endowment Fund for the Goleta Depot Railroad Museum. We feel that the endowment, as a permanent source of income, can become a key ingredient in the perpetuation and growth of the museum. We invite our fellow members and others in your community to join with us in building the endowment to a level where it can really make a difference for the Goleta Depot Railroad Museum and its fine educational and recreational programs."

Bartel said that the Institute has decided to accept the Thomases' challenge to build the endowment and has begun a campaign to increase its level to \$175,000 through donations from members and others. Contributions or pledges of \$500 or more had been received from George Adams, Eugene Allen, Raymond Baird, Gary Coombs, Barbara Cornish, Anna Dato, Roger Levenson, Kimberly Press, William McNally, Phyllis Olsen, Santa Barbara Research Center, and John Marshall Starr, he said. There has also been one anonymous \$5,000 cash contribution, bringing the total received or pledged to \$32,000 or about 18% of the goal.

Sacramento Excursion Planned

The museum is organizing a fall rail excursion to Sacramento, on the occasion of the 6th annual U.S. National Handcar Races. We will leave Santa Barbara on Thurs., Sept. 15 and return Monday the 19th.

The package includes roundtrip rail fare; four nights lodging; admission to the California State Railroad Museum, including a VIP guided-tour of the museum and restoration shops; and a Sunday brunch cruise on the stern-wheel steamer, Elizabeth Louise. The cost is \$320 per person.

We will again have a team in the handcar competition. Why not join us and help cheer this year's "fearless five" on to victory! This will be the museum's fourth Sacramento trip in the past six years.

Another Steaming Summer Ahead

Preparations are about complete for another summer of train rides on the museum's 1-1/2-inch-gauge railroad. Runs will be the second and fourth Saturdays of July (9th and 23rd), August (13th and 27th), and September (10th and 24th), from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The Lompoc Museum is located at 200 South H St. Hours are 1-5 p.m., Tuesday thru Friday and 1-4 p.m. weekends (closed Mondays).

Gutter Work Marks Major Advance In Depot Restoration

An important and long-awaited step in the restoration of Goleta Depot took place in May with the replacement of the building's old redwood gutters. Most of the original gutters had been lost or were removed during the main restoration effort in 1982, due to their badly deteriorated condition.

The museum had new matching gutter stock milled several years ago in Sacramento, but it remained stored in a local garage until bed-tax funds made available by the Goleta Valley Chamber of Commerce permitted the installation work to commence. At this writing, the addition of the downspouts is in progress.

Old Phone Is Cranky Again

Another authentic touch has been added to the freight office display, thanks to the efforts of volunteers Pete Langlo and Joe Heumphreus. Joe and Pete were able to devise a way to ring the old crank telephone by means of a remote button.

Historically, the crank phone was used to link depots and section houses in the general area. When the crank on the wooden wall phone was turned, it rang all of the other phones on the network. Ring codes (consisting of short and long rings) were used to identify who you were calling. Goleta Depot's "number" was two long rings followed by two short rings. Of course, anyone could eavesdrop on everyone else's calls.

Joe's and Pete's success makes it possible for the museum docents to demonstrate how it sounded when a call came in to Goleta Depot: Rrrrrring... Rrrrrrring... Ring... Ring...

Our crank phone was donated by the Southern Pacific Transportation Co. It was used formerly at the old Surf station.

New Hands-On Display Finished

Restoration has been completed on an antique counter-top balance scale, acquired by the museum about two years ago, which has been made into a simple hands-on exhibit. The accompanying display card invites the museum visitor to find out "How much does the package weigh?" It goes on to tell how the depot

PORTRAIT OF A MUSEUM VOLUNTEER

Eugene Gilbert Allen was born in Rochester, N.Y. in 1921. He studied engineering in college and for many years called Long Island home. He and his bride of 42 years, the former Alma Loeven, have three grown children, Christine, David, and Pattie.

The family moved to this area in 1958, when Gene took the job of experimental shop foreman at Servo-Mechanisms, Inc. Five years later, he went into business for himself, establishing Allen Models, Inc. for the manufacture of miniature live-steam locomotives. Alma is executive director of the Santa Barbara Scholarship Foundation, where she has been for 14 years.

Gene has been active with the Goleta Valley Railroad Club since 1958, serving three terms as president. He is also an accomplished horseman. Gene and Alma also enjoy travel, theatre, and walks in the company of Charity and Tristin, their pet dogs.

Gene has served as a depot volunteer since 1981. His great knowledge of railroading was especially welcome to the project. He was the depot's first curator and, in 1982, he restored the heavily-vandalized window bay of the depot freight office. The salvage and sale of the bricks from the original depot foundation also was done under Gene's leadership.

He became chairman of the Depot Committee in 1983, serving for over four years. His deepest involvement, however, has come with the museum's two track projects. The full-size track and the portable track for the live-steam train ride both were Gene Allen creations from design through completion.

Today, Gene Allen is Institute Vice-President and serves on the Museum Committee. Recently, he has been instrumental in getting the museum endowment established and in mounting its fundraising campaign.
