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# PORTRAIT OF A MUSEUM VOLUNTEER

Paul Conover has been a stalwart member of the Goleta Depot Railroad Museum's agent corps since the early months of 1985.

Paul was born in Amsterdam, New York, where his parents ran a lakeside summer camp. It was an ideal setting for a boy who loved swimming, boating, and fishing. His swimming skills earned young Paul an instructor's job at the YMCA.

Paul and Mary Conover began their lives together as husband and wife in 1941. Paul served as a Machinist 3rd Class during World War II, aboard the aircraft carrier, U.S.S. Bennington. He was on hand to witness the first strikes on Tokyo in 1944, and also survived a typhoon during his tour of duty in the Pacific.

After the war, Paul returned home to New York. In 1959, the Conovers came to California, where Paul landed a machinist's job at the Curtiss Wright plant in Goleta, where Delco is today. He held several other local positions as a machinist, retiring in 1985 from the Industrial Automation Corporation.

The Conovers have one daughter, Karen, who is a teacher and assistant principal at a parochial school in San Francisco.

Paul has been an active member of the Goleta Valley Railroad Club since 1960, another reflection of his love of railroading and train modeling. More recently, his skills and avocation have proven indispensable to the construction and maintenance of the miniature railroad at the Goleta Depot Railroad Museum. Riding his motorcycle is another of Paul's favorite diversions.

#### Museum Attendance On The Rise

Attendance at the Goleta Depot Railroad Museum through the first eight weeks of 1989 is up 28% over the same period last year.

Some of the increase can be attributed to a rise in special group visits to the Museum, which have grown 76% over 1988 figures. Group tours have included students from Mrs. Jefferson's Vieja Valley School kindergarten class, and children from the YMCA after-school program, and from the Westside Boys and Girls Club.

On all of its school fieldtrips, the Museum provides handout pages, worksheets, and other on-board activities which enhance the learning experience for the children by relating railroading and the train trip to current classroom subjects.

Two more railroad adventures are scheduled for the remainder of this school year.
