Upcoming Films Announced

Three Miles High, a BBC film on rail travel in Peru, will be shown at the museum every Sunday in December. The 50-minute documentary features two Peruvian rail journeys. The first takes viewers from the sea-level capital of Lima to the city of Huancayo, high in the Andes mountains, on a line built to recover the rich mineral wealth of the country's interior.

Learn how the railroad builders used 60 tunnels, 45 bridges, and an elaborate system of zig-zag track to achieve an elevation of 16,000 feet. Toward journey's end, car attendants offer passengers bottled oxygen to supplement the rarified air!

The second rail excursion begins at the ancient Incan capital of Cuzco, still a thriving population center, and ends in neighboring Bolivia. It includes a sidetrip to the lost city of Machu Pichu and a steamboat cruise on Lake Titicaca. The 1981 documentary is part of the "Great Railway Journeys Of The World" series.

Showings will be at 1, 2, and 3 o'clock each Sunday afternoon. The film is free, but seating is limited, so

please call ahead (964-3540) to reserve seats.

Future offerings include Coast To Coast, about U.S. rail passenger travel (scheduled for Sunday afternoons in January); The Other Poland, a look at how steam trains continue to serve there (slated for February); and Deccan, about the railroads of India (March). Please contact the museum during the month of showing for starting times and to make your reservations.

"Steaming Summer" Ends With Sizzle

Sept. 22 marked the last day of another successful "Steaming Summer" event, Over the four event Saturdays, which began on June 23, 1,090 passengers rode, including 967 train riders plus, on June 23, another 123 riders on the handcar. The daily average of 241 train riders set an event record; on Aug. 25, a singleday record of 301 passengers was established.

A number of new features made this year's event a landmark one. The tri-tip sandwiches and hot dogs, prepared and served by members of the Goleta Lions Club, added importantly to the event. So did the spotlighting of different guest engines during the course of the event, including Ed Winnewisser's 0-4-0 switcher, John Darby's mogul, and Gene Allen's American.

Trip to Railfair '91 Slated for May 6-9

Railfair '91 will be held next May in Sacramento, to celebrate the 10th Anniversary of the California State Railroad Museum. To partake of the festivities the Goleta Depot Railroad Museum is planning a group

tour over the May 6-9 period.

The Railfair theme will be "Railroads on Parade: The Evolution of the Iron Horse." The first and only Railfair to date, held back in 1981 to mark the opening of the state rail museum, is generally considered a benchmark celebration of Western railroading, but Railfair '91 promises to eclipse its predecessor by a considerable margin. An impressive list of visiting locomotives and other equipment is being assembled,

along with many special exhibits, displays, and demonstrations. Watch for further particulars in the

Planning for Bedroom Restoration and Refurnishing Begins

Refurnishing of the agent's bedroom as an exhibit space has long been a museum goal. When the Audubon Society elected not to renew its lease of this room last year, realization of this goal became a near-

term possibility.

Museum staff has now begun the background research and planning needed for this historic room exhibit. A number of furnishings have already been placed on the list of potential exhibit elements. They include a dressing table, bed, chest-of-drawers, mantel clock, framed prints, ceiling fixture, rug, and chair.

Conservation Assessment Completed

Sara Chase, an architectural conservator from Lexington, Mass. and John Twilley, a collections conservator from Los Angeles have completed an evaluation of Goleta Depot and of the museum's collections of

artifacts, photographs, and printed materials.

The evaluation was commissioned by the museum, with a grant from the National Institute for Conservation. Its purpose was to identify ways in which the museum could improve its preservation and conservation practices. Chase and Twilley visited the museum at the end of September before preparing their written reports. These contain a number of valuable recommendations - from how to keep out pests to controlling temperature and humidity - which the museum will now use to develop plans for the future.

Coombs To Chair New ARM Committee

Director Gary Coombs has been selected to chair a new committee of the Assn. of Railway Museums (ARM). The purpose of the committee is to evaluate "the feasibility and benefits of developing a uniform nomenclature for classifying railroad artifacts."

ARM is the North American organization of railroad museums, with about 70 member-institutions in the

U.S. and Canada.
