#### **New Exhibit Features Toy Depots**

Don't miss the new exhibition, "Toy Trains Need Depots, Too!: The Railroad Station in Miniature", now showing in the Waiting Room through October. Featured are 19 antique toy stations from the collection of Robert Sponsel. They are accented by an assortment of human and animal figures, vehicles, baggage, signs, and other accessories - also from the Sponsel collection.

The exhibit covers the period 1918-1942. It includes examples from three major American manufacturers of toy trains: Ives, American Flyer, and Lionel. These companies made both clockwork and electric trains.

The exhibition is housed in a new display case built for the museum by the Pacific Fixture Co. of Woodland Hills. The handsome case will be used for a new program of changing-exhibits at the museum. The purchase was made using income

from the Richard and Georgia Thomas Endowment Fund. \*

## Museum Loses Two Longtime Friends

Eugene Sheller, a charter member of the "Friends of Goleta Depot," passed away in the spring. The museum has received a memorial gift in Eugene Sheller's name from Gene and Alma Allen.

Bev Casselman, who served as a Goleta Depot "agent" volunteer for several years, also has died. The Goleta Lions Club has started a special fund in Bev's memory in the museum endowment. Contributions have also been made by Earl and Rose Ann Hill and Gary Coombs. Persons wishing to donate to this fund should add the notation "Bev Casselman memorial" to their check, which may be sent to the museum.

#### Wells Fargo Express Sign Re-created

Another valuable restoration step was made recently with the long-awaited production and installation of a replica Wells Fargo Express sign like the one that once hung outside of Goleta Depot's freight office window bay. The project was funded by proceeds from the Richard and Georgia Thomas Endowment Fund.

In Oct. 1869, just a few months after completion of the transcontinental railroad, the Central Pacific Railroad awarded Wells Fargo & Company an exclusive contract to carry express over its routes. In exchange, the Central Pacific, which later became the Southern Pacific Railroad, received one-third of all Wells Fargo stock. Thus, when Goleta Depot opened in 1901, the depot office incorporated a Wells Fargo & Company express facility, with the stationmaster doubling as Wells Fargo agent.

An early photograph of Goleta Depot, presented to us several years ago by the Southern Pacific Transportation Co., shows two signs flanking the front of the window bay: a Western Union telegraph sign on the left (re-created in 1989) and a Wells Fargo sign on the right. From this rare photo and information provided by Wells Fargo Bank's History Museum in Los Angeles, it was determined that the company had installed one of its standard signs at the Goleta station.

Specifications for the replica sign were based on a surviving example of this standard. The metal sign is 9 inches tall and 18 inches wide, with white lettering and detail on a dark blue background. Distinctive of the sign is an inset-stripe border and a fancy double-scroll design in the center.

In 1918, as a wartime measure, the U.S. government consolidated the country's major express companies, including Wells Fargo, to form American Railway Express, later the Railway Express Agency. The Railway Express Agency office at Goleta Depot served local households and businesses until 1961.

#### Other New Signs Give Direction

Visitors now have a number of new informational signs to direct them around the museum and grounds. One sign identifies the location of the Gandy Dancer Theater. Also, the street and parking lot signs have all been redone to reflect the museum name change. Finally, for use on days when the miniature train runs, there is another new sign indicating where tickets can be purchased and where one waits for a ride.

#### Museum Stars In Public Library Display

Throughout August, the Santa Barbara Public Library, shared a display of railroad museum scenes, artifacts, programs, and activities in its Main Branch lobby. These community displays are an effective way to reach people who haven't visited the museum or are unaware of what there is to see and do here.

### County Work Furlough Program Benefits Museum

The railroad museum is participating in the county program in which misdemeanor offenders are sentenced to community-service hours instead of jail time. Gene Allen has been supervising the work details, normally scheduled for Thursdays.

The museum has already received more than 100

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hours of free labor through this on-going program. Most of the work has focused on the museum grounds, including landscaping and maintenance of the miniature railroad track, among other activities. •

#### **Endowment Campaign Advances**

A milestone in the campaign to build the Richard and Georgia Thomas Endowment Fund was reached a few weeks ago when the pledge total passed the \$75,000 mark, dropping the balance needed to under \$100,000. A \$250 increase in Home Savings of America's commitment made the critical difference.

As of this writing, the campaign is at the \$77,660 level, less than \$10,000 from the pivotal half-way point. The Board of Trustees set the initial goal of \$175,000 in 1988 when the endowment was started.

All gifts to the endowment are invested and kept in perpetuity. Proceeds from the endowment investments are used exclusively for Goleta Depot and the railroad museum. The Earl and Rose Ann Hill Education Fund for Children's Programs comprises a special part of the overall museum endowment. #### Summer Program Going Strong

It's turning out to be another record-setting summer for the museum and its miniature train-ride program, where ridership has topped 1,800 since June 1. Attendance has been especially busy on the three Steaming Summer dates, which have accounted for 710 riders. Tickets issued on Aug. 24 and July 29 were the second

and third highest, respectively, in the four-year history of the event. Through Aug. 24, the trains have carried 2,650 passengers in 1991, up 25% over a year ago.

Important to the increase have been the expansion to a weekly schedule since July 1 and the new \$2

Steaming Summer has benefitted greatly from its special attractions, including the delicious hot sandwiches served up by the Goleta Lions Club. Guest steam-engines have included John Darby's mogul, Ed Winnewisser's 0-6-0, and Gene Allen's American. The addition of free showings of Thomas The Tank Engine videos has also been very popular. Another Steaming Summer is co-sponsored by Toyota of Santa Barbara, where discount ride coupons are available. The last day for this Steaming Summer is Sept. 28.

As with many of the museum's programs, Steaming Summer and the miniature train ride would not be possible without our hard-working and dedicated volunteers, including train-crew members as well as those who staff the other museum areas. •
