Asphalt Regatta Slated For May 2 Make-up Will Be May 16

Please mark the morning of Saturday, May 2 on your calendar. If it's already filled, mark May 16, instead. These are the dates for the 1992 Asphalt Regatta, and the museum needs your help to make this year's event — planned as the largest fundraiser in museum history — a success. The Regatta is so important this year that it will be the first time that a make-up date has been added to ensure that everyone who cares about the museum will have a chance to participate. All funds from the event benefit the railroad museum and Goleta Depot.

Please plan to attend, and bring along your

family, friends, and neighbors, too.

This year, the Board of Trustees, which sponsors the event, has set a goal of \$12,000, the highest amount in the 11-year history of the Regatta. To achieve this goal, board members, staff, and others are busy lining up major sponsors who will pledge a combined total of \$50 for every person participating in the event.

Early pledges have already been obtained from Allen Models Inc., Sue Borgatello, Burton Decker Antiques, Goleta Lions Club, Home Savings of America, Kinko's Graphics by Cole, Santa Barbara Bank & Trust, Ernest and Metta Thomsen, and Trout Computing. If you would like to join these sponsors, please complete and return the accompanying form, which may also be used if you'd like to be a participant, yourself.

When the \$50 target is reached, every participating couple will earn \$100 for the museum, while a family of four will bring in \$200. A minimum of 200 participants is needed if we are to

reach our financial goal.

Anyone may participate, members and nonmembers, alike. There's no entry fee and all you need to do is walk, at your own leisurely pace, either of the event's two courses at Lake Los Carneros County Park. One course is about a mile long and the other is about two miles in length (It takes most people 30-90 minutes to complete a course). There are always plenty of folks to walk with, if you like. Some participants like to ride their bikes or jog, instead.

Please assemble at Goleta Depot not later than 9:45 a.m. for registration and the tradition-

al group photograph.

There will be refreshments following the event and, as an added bonus, free miniature train rides will be given, beginning at 11 a.m. on May 2 only, for all who participate.

Many participants will also be collecting pledges of their own. This is an important ingredient in the overall fundraising strategy. Las Vegas Rail Trip Will Be April 5-7

It's "All Aboard" for our first-ever Slow Train To Vegas which departs Sunday, April 5. The museum group will be staying two nights at the lavish, new Main Street Station Hotel and Casino. South Coast Railroad Museum Collection Started At UCSB

A new collection, named after the railroad museum, has been created at the UCSB Library, Dept. of Special Collections, in an agreement between the university and the museum's Board of Trustees. About 300 items from the museum's printed-materials collection — including timetables, brochures, manuals and other publications, representing the Southern Pacific and other U.S. and foreign railroads — have been placed in the "South Coast Railroad Museum Collection."

The main reason for moving these valuable items to UCSB is to provide better long-term protection, according to Museum Director Gary Coombs. UCSB's Dept. of Special Collections, which also houses the Pearl Chase and Walker A. Tompkins historical collections, and many other rare book and archival collections, offers state-of-the-art controls of temperature and humidity, two of the most serious threats to preservation.

Another benefit is better access for scholars, students, and other researchers. Head of Special Collections David C. Tambo said, "I am very pleased to add this fine assemblage of railroad materials to the Special Collections Dept. of the UCSB Library. It will provide a wealth of information to researchers locally and throughout the country."

Rain Postpones Sweetheart Trip

The February rains shut down Southern Pacific operations along the coast for several days, forcing us to reschedule the Sweetheart Special trip to San Diego. The change — to the weekend of March 7-8 — had to be made on Thursday, Feb. 13, only two days before the planned departure, affecting 53 persons — from Cambria, Lompoc, Goleta, Santa Barbara, Carpinteria, Camarillo, and Torrance — who had made reservations for the trip.

Project Progress; More Help Needed

A number of construction, maintenance, and conservation projects have advanced in recent months, thanks in large part to the volunteer efforts of Gene Allen.

Gene has done a lot of repair work inside of the caboose, fixing the entry door, patching holes, painting, and generally making it more suitable for visitors. The old rail car is now open five days a week, during all museum hours.

Re-creation of the agent's bedroom is also proceeding. The antique bed frame donated by Bob Sponsel and Patricia Chidlaw has been reassembled; a full-size mattress and box spring are now needed (condition is unimportant). Can you help?

Gene has also finished the model railroad guard railing, which serves both to protect the exhibit and to improve visitor safety. Dan Lopez recently repaired the exhibit's Daylight engine, while Bob McNeel helped by pruning the roses

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behind the stationhouse. Edee Brown has applied lots of elbow grease during recent stints as weekday agent to help keep the freight office and other rooms sparkling. Some touch-up painting in the Trackside Shop has improved the appearance of the little train that circles the room. Much recent effort, by volunteers and staff alike, has been directed at combating the adverse effects of the February rains, including flooding in the handcar shed and underneath Goleta Depot.

Participation in the Conservation Days, on Jan. 4 and Feb. 1, has been disappointing, however. Only Gene Allen showed up to assist staff members Gary Coombs and Phyllis Olsen.

The need, however, is greater than ever. The recent heavy rains have accelerated the peeling of paint from the depot exterior, as well as caus-

ing flood damage and other problems.

Help is needed from throughout the museum membership. The next two Conservation Days will be April 4 and June 6. Work will start at 8:30 a.m. There will not be a work day on March 7, due to the rescheduled Sweetheart Special, or on May 2, the date of the Asphalt Regatta.

Smith Family Bequest Received

The Institute for American Research has received a \$24,500 gift from the estate of Verna Smith, who died last June. Mrs. Smith and her husband, Carl, who passed away several years ago, were staunch supporters of Institute programs, including Goleta Depot, the railroad museum, and the Publications In Local History series. The entire bequest has been placed in the endowment funds, in the names of Carl and Verna Smith, as follows: \$14,500 to the Richard and Georgia Thomas Endowment Fund; \$5,000 to the Earl and Rose Ann Hill Education Fund for Children's Programs; and \$5,000 to the Deborah Spalding Pelissero and Godwin Joseph Pelissero Publication Fund.

Coombs Chosen As IMS Reviewer

transportation (railroad, air, automobile, space, and maritime) museums.
