## Hop Aboard "Easter Bunny Express"

#### Team Competition To Highlight 12th Asphalt Regatta

The museum needs your help for a successful 1993 Asphalt Regatta, our big spring fundraiser. The event is slated for Saturday, May 8, with a make-up on May 15 for anyone unable to attend the first date.

This year, the Board of Trustees has set a goal of \$11,000 for the event. All funds raised go to the railroad museum and maintenance of Goleta Depot.

The Regatta is crucial to the museum: In 1992, pledges passed the \$9,000 mark, accounting for more than 10% of the money the museum needed to operate for the year.

A minimum of 200 participants is needed again this year to reach our financial goal. Anyone may participate, including non-members. There's no entry fee and all you need to do is walk, at your own leisurely pace, either of two event courses at Lake Los Carneros Park. One course is about a mile long and the other is about twice that length (Most people take 30-45 minutes to complete.). There are always plenty of folks to accompany you (Last year, we had over 200 Regatta participants!). Some folks like to ride their bikes or jog, instead of walking.

Board members, staff, and others are lining up major sponsors who will pledge a combined total of \$50 for every person participating in the event (Last year, we assembled over \$43 per participant in major-sponsor pledges). When that \$50 target is reached, every participating couple will earn \$100 for the museum, while a family of four will bring in \$200.

Many participants will also be collecting pledges

on their own. This is always a big added boost toward reaching our goal. To encourage this extra effort this year, two teams — composed of trustees, docents, members, and staff — are now forming and a friendly competition to determine the best fundraisers has begun. For more information about the team competition, including details on how to join a team, please consult the accompanying flyer. It is not necessary to join a team in order to participate, however.

Refreshments will be served following the event and, as an added incentive, all participants will receive free miniature-train rides.

#### Fridays Added to Train-Ride Schedule for March

During the month of March, the museum will be testing the further expansion of the weekly miniaturetrain ride schedule. Rides will be offered every Friday, from 2 until 3:30 p.m., in addition to the current schedule, which includes every Wednesday (also 2-3:30) and all second and fourth Saturdays (1-4 p.m.). Al Jaramillo will serve as engineer on Fridays, assisted by Gary Coombs and Phyllis Olsen, who work together to run the train every Wednesday.

If the March experiment is successful and regular volunteers can be found, Fridays may become a permanent part of the miniature-train schedule. The Wednesday train-ride program has been extremely beneficial to the museum since it was started last spring. In the second half of 1992, Wednesday ridership was more than 24 passengers per day, while total museum attendance on Wednesdays jumped 56% compared to 1991, to about 34 visitors daily.

## Sweetheart Special Successful

Unlike last year, the museum luckily found enough dry weather in the midst of another rainy winter season, to hold a successful 1993 Sweetheart Special weekend on Feb. 13-14. A group of 48 took part in this year's festivities.

Having exclusive occupancy of the custom-coach car on the San Diegan for the first time was a big plus.

#### Santa Barbara Bank Assumes Endowment Responsibility

The Board of Trustees has obtained the services of Santa Barbara Bank & Trust as financial advisor and manager of the organization's endowment funds.

The endowment principal totals over \$119,000, which is divided into three distinct funds: the Richard and Georgia Thomas Endowment Fund of the South Coast Railroad Museum, which exceeds \$72,000; the Deborah Spalding Pelissero and Godwin Joseph Pelissero Publication Fund, over \$27,000; and the Earl and Rose Ann Hill Education Fund for Children's Programs, \$20,000.

Gifts to the endowments are held in perpetuity and invested. Income from the investments are used to advance the specific objectives of the respective fund.

### Future Speakers Announced



#### New Exhibition Examines Rural Railroad Station in America

The new exhibit in the Waiting Room uses Goleta Depot and other Southern Pacific stations in southern Santa Barbara County to exemplify an American institution: the historic country railroad station.

The display utilizes a number of items from the museum's collections, including one of the original "Goleta" signboards, wall and pocket timepieces, telegraphy equipment, station tools, and a handsome Ogauge model of Southern Pacific's Palmdale depot, scratch-built by Orlyn Glover.
