"Fiesta Train" Slated for Old Spanish Days

The railroad museum will be participating in the Old Spanish Days celebration for the first time this year with a new event, **Tren de la Fiesta** ("Fiesta Train"). The event is set for Saturday, Aug. 7 at Goleta Depot, from noon until 4 p.m., following the Children's Parade on State St. There will be free miniature-train rides until 2 p.m. for all youngsters attending in Fiesta

Museum Added to AAA Tourbook

All that will change in 1994, when the South Coast Railroad Museum at Goleta Depot will be added to the new issue of the widely-circulated travel guide.

"Another Steaming Summer" Is Here

Another busy season of live-steam railroading at the museum will begin on Saturday, June 26, the kickoff for our 6th Annual Another Steaming Summer event. Highlighting the first day's festivities will be **Gene Allen**'s 4-4-0 American, a Steaming Summer favorite built by Allen Models, Inc. Single rides on the miniature train are \$1 and unlimited-ride tickets will also be available for \$3.

The event continues on July 24 and Aug. 28. Hours for all three Saturdays will be 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., with all regular museum areas open for the expanded schedule. There will also be continuous free showings of *Thomas The Tank Engine* videos in the museum's Gandy Dancer Theater throughout the event.

Members of the **Goleta Lions Club** will again be on hand to prepare and sell hot sandwiches, with all proceeds benefitting the railroad museum.

Toyota of Santa Barbara is sponsor for Another Steaming Summer. Coupons good for 1/2-off on rides, including the unlimited-ride tickets, are available to adults visiting the car dealership at 5611 Hollister Ave.

Director and Asst. Director Ride Sunset Limited Inaugural Train

On March 28, Amtrak inaugurated the first transcontinental train in U.S. history, when the Los Angeles-to-New Orleans *Sunset Limited* was officially extended to Miami. Aboard for the inaugural trip were South Coast Railroad Museum Director **Gary Coombs** and Assistant Director **Phyllis Olsen**, both guests of Amtrak. Although hundreds of people accepted Amtrak's invitation to ride the inaugural train at least part of the way, Coombs and Olsen were the only two to complete the entire 6,132-mile roundtrip, which included the April 2-6 return aboard the first regularlyscheduled *westbound* transcontinental.

During the inaugural trip, Coombs and Olsen rep-(continued on page 2)

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resented the Goleta Valley Chamber of Commerce, as well as the railroad museum. Along the way they made a number of presentations, of commemorative certificates and Chamber label pins, to many of the VIPs they met aboard the train or among the welcoming groups in the towns and cities, including the mayors of Mobile, Ala. and Orlando and West Palm Beach, Fl.

There was extensive coverage of the historic event by local, regional, and national media. Phyllis was quoted in the April 9 "Cover Story" in USA Today. Both appeared in a CNN television special, "The Singing of the Rails: A Ride into History," which aired May 22.

Sunset Limited Experiences Will Be Shared June 16

Museum Director Gary Coombs and Assistant Director Phyllis Olsen will present a program on the inaugural trip of the *Sunset Limited*, the first transcontinental train in U.S. history, on Wednesday, June 16 at the Goleta Library, 500 N. Fairview Ave. beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The program will include a presentation of slides from the event-filled 10-day trip and a variety of display materials, including historic Southern Pacific travel posters from the museum's collections. Refreshments will be served following the presentation.

The program is part of the South Coast Railroad Museum's monthly evening lecture series. All series programs are free and open to the public.

Volunteers To Be Recognized June 16

The June 16th library gathering will also be the occasion for a Volunteer Appreciation ceremony. There will be presentations and all docents will be honored for their service to the museum. Members are urged to attend to join in honoring the hard work and dedication of the museum's volunteers.

Future Speakers Slated

An interesting assortment of subjects are scheduled for upcoming museum meetings. Postponed from June, "Some Surprises from Recent Goleta Depot Research" will be the subject of the July 21 meeting.

Vivian Obern will speak on historic Hope House at the Aug. 18 gathering. No one can give the subject of Hope House a more personal touch than Vie Obern, who, with her husband, George, bought the dilapidated mansion in 1967 and saw to its restoration and eventual listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Sept. 15 speaker will be **Alexandra Cole**, who will discuss "The Architecture of Goleta Depot." A local historic preservationist, Cole is chairman of the County's Historical Landmarks Advisory Committee.

All programs begin at 7:30 p.m. and are free and open to the general public. They are held at the Goleta Library, 500 N. Fairview Ave.

Audiences Grow For Speakers Program

Attendance at the museum meetings has been growing steadily over the months. Audiences for the last three presentations averaged just over 28 attendees. All three programs — **Neal Graffy**'s "Santa Barbara: Then and Now," **Gene Allen**'s discussion of "How a Steam Locomotive Works," and the reprise of "Railroad Stations" by **Robert McNeel** — were skillfully done and favorably received by their audiences.

Train-Ride Schedule Expands

Fridays have been added to the permanent schedule of the miniature-train ride, which will also now operate every Saturday afternoon.

The decision to include Fridays was based on the success of a test begun in March. Over the 12-week trial period, daily participation on Fridays averaged about 13 riders. During the same period, an average of about 16 visitors rode the train on Wednesdays, which

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joined the regular train-ride schedule last July.

The train ride affects the museum in a number of positive ways. Because of the ride's recreational value, it further encourages school and youth groups to tour the museum. In fact, *overall* museum attendance is generally much higher on the days that the train runs. During the test period, Friday attendance averaged 23 visitors, up 70% from the daily figures recorded within the same time-frame a year ago.

The museum has also increased the weekend ride schedule to include all Saturdays. Previously, weekend operations were limited to second and fourth Saturdays, a practice started last November.

Museum Gains Three New Docents

Three new docents-in-training have been added to the museum's volunteer ranks. Ronald Ferguson, Kenny Lin, and Ed Leska attended the orientation session on March 19 and have begun staffing the museum as their training continues.

Docent Session Will Be July 10

There will be an orientation class on Saturday, July 10 for persons interested in becoming museum docents. The three-hour session begins at 9 a.m.

The museum's docents are vital to the staffing of most areas and activities when the museum is open to the public. Docents operate the miniature-train and handcar rides, staff the Trackside Shop, and share the historical landmark and model railroad exhibit with museum visitors.

Asphalt Regatta Report

The 1993 Asphalt Regatta garnered \$8,440 in pledges, eclipsing the final proceeds from last year's event by \$79. The total, however, did fall about \$2,500 short of the \$11,000 goal set by the Board of Trustees.

More than 100 members and friends participated in this year's event. The museum's Docent Association was especially well-represented: docents and their families comprised about one-third of the total participant group. Junior Engineers and their families supplied another 23 participants.

Joe Lemons, with strong assistance from his wife, Diane, led all trustees by securing \$850 in pledges. Hilda Volkman was the number-one moneyraiser among all docents with \$360 pledged. Nancy Ried raised \$200, tops from the general membership.

In the team competition, the **Blue Team** was victorious, raising \$4,544 or about 54% of the total, compared with a respectable \$3,896 from the **Red Team**. All Asphalt Regatta participants and sponsors will be acknowledged in an upcoming Santa Barbara News-Press advertisement in which major sponsors and participants raising \$200 or more will be listed by name.

Depot Day will be Sept. 25

The 11th Annual Depot Day celebration will be marked by two important scheduling changes. This year, in a break with tradition, the event will take place on a Saturday rather than a Sunday. And, Depot Day '93 has been moved up on the calendar by almost a month to Sept. 25. The event's customary day, the third Sunday in October, has been abandoned this year to avoid the scheduling conflict encountered last fall with the Goleta Lemon Festival. The railroad museum will again participate in the Lemon Festival, which is slated for Oct. 17.

Enthusiasm ran high among the estimated 1,000 attendees, for the holiday-theme event featuring volunteers and staff sporting fluffy bunny ears and an abundance of colorful decorations.

The entire supply of 450 special egg-shaped Easter Bunny Express tickets were sold out long before the event came to a close. Each ticketholder was entitled to participate in all event activities, which were listed as a "schedule of stops:" Wabbit-Twacks Station (to board the miniature train); Harvey's House (for a cookie and beverage); Easter-Bunnyville (to meet the Easter Bunny, ably rendered by Docent Bob Burtness, and select an egg-filled surprise); Jack-Rabbit Junction (to enter a drawing for a stuffed bunny [won by Patty Burns]); and What's Up Dock (to collect a sketch of the Easter Bunny Express train for coloring).

Many volunteers helped to bring this wonderful new event to fruition. Kinko's Graphics by Cole made a major contribution in the form of free printing services. Decorative plants were donated by Paul and Carolyn Nielson's Central Coast Wholesale; balloons by Ginny Bryant's Fairview Florist; and cookies by Anna's Fairview Bakery.

The idea for the Easter event came from Trustees Craig Schmidt and Mary Cole, who puzzled over what might be done with Craig's set of paper-cutting dies that turned out egg-shaped ovals. The result was the trademark Easter Bunny Express ticket. The rest is history.
