The event continues on July 23 and Aug. 27. Hours for all three Saturdays will be 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., with all regular museum areas open for the expanded schedule. There will also be continuous free showings of *Thomas The Tank Engine* videos in the museum's Gandy Dancer Theater throughout the event.

Members of the Goleta Lions Club will again be on hand to prepare and sell hot sandwiches, with all proceeds benefitting the railroad museum.

## **Museum Receives Recognition**

Museum Director Gary Coombs recently completed his third year of service as a field reviewer for the Institute of Museum Services' annual General Operating Support grant program. Coombs is one of several hundred professionals from museums across the country who serve as reviewers for IMS, a federal agency that offers programs for the nation's museums.

This year, Gary reviewed applications from a number of transportation museums (air, space, automobile, marine, and railroad) with budgets up to about \$400,000, distributed throughout the United States. In recognition of Dr. Coombs' continuing service, our museum received a handsome certificate, signed by the chairman of the National Museum Services Board, expressing "deep appreciation" for "exceptional contributions to the United States government and the museums of this nation." The certificate is permanently displayed in the Gandy Dancer Theater, joining other honors and awards our museum has received over the years.

# "Fiesta Train" Set For Aug. 6

The second annual El Tren de la Fiesta ("Fiesta Train") will be held Saturday, Aug. 6, in celebration of

The event will be held at Goleta Depot from 12 noon until 4 p.m., following the Children's Parade on State Street. ## Attendance Keeps Growing

Museum attendance continues to rise. Last year at this time, we reported record attendance for the first quarter of 1993. The museum has experienced another strong increase in visitor numbers this year, with first-quarter attendance up 23% compared with a year ago. The most dramatic rise was in weekday figures, where daily attendance averaged 22 visitors over the first three months of 1994.

Ridership on the Goleta Short Line miniature train increased by 88%, reflecting expansion of the schedule to include every Saturday. Film attendance also set a first-quarter record this year — up 16% to 880 total viewers.

#### Killdeer Add Relish To Train Ride

Did you hear about the killdeer? Back in March, a pair of the birds built their nest on the miniature-train tracks, in the pea-gravel directly between the rails and two ties. After momma-bird had laid four eggs, she became understandably belligerent whenever the miniature train came along, chasing her off the nest.

Finally, on April 2, only hours before the Easter Bunny Express began carrying its 549 passengers on the Goleta Short Line, Museum Director Gary Coombs moved the nest, eggs and all, a few feet out of harm's way. Miraculously, Mrs. Killdeer accepted the new situation and returned to the relocated nest. For the next couple of weeks, the killdeer and the riders on passing trains enjoyed one another's company, without further incident.

The youngsters hatched during the week of April 18 and have now flown away to lives of their own.

## Motorcar Indicator Repaired

Caps off to volunteer Ron Ferguson for repairing the motorcar-indicator exhibit in Goleta Depot's Waiting Room. The exhibit uses an actual indicator signal to demonstrate how the device warns track workers and inspection crews of approaching trains. One of the museum's most popular small exhibits, it allows visitors to press a button to activate the signalling equipment.

## Museum Receives Major In-Kind Gift

Sam Dabney of Santa Barbara has donated a valuable assemblage of equipment and materials to the railroad museum. Included in the gift were a 7-1/2-inch gauge gas-powered locomotive and flat car, 1000 feet of aluminum rail, 500 redwood ties, and a box of miscellaneous track hardware — all for miniature-railroad

The locomotive, which is not suitable for hauling trains on the Goleta Short Line, will be sold, while the flat car will be adapted and the track materials used to expand and maintain the miniature railroad.

Two years ago, Mr. Dabney donated to the museum a miniature live-steam road tractor kit, which Eugene Allen assembled for the purpose of eventual sale. In April, the completed road tractor was sold, with the \$3,500 in proceeds applied toward purchasing the new locomotive for the Goleta Short Line, and for museum operations.

The Goleta Short Line's schedule of train rides will be expanded to include Sundays beginning July 10. The additional operating day was approved by the Board of Trustee's Executive Committee in April after the matter was discussed with volunteers and members at the March gathering at Goleta Library.

Sunday hours will be 2 to 3:30 p.m. The miniature train also runs 2 to 3:30 p.m. every Wednesday and Friday, and 1 to 4 p.m. every Saturday.

# Safari Fundraiser Earns Big Dividend

It appears likely that the May 21 Too-Fari Safari, the 1994 edition of the Asphalt Regatta, will be the most successful spring fundraiser in the event's 13year history. As this issue of the Depot Dispatch goes to press, pledges have reached \$9,082 — already matching the record figure set two years ago - with many pledges yet to be counted.

A bevy of teams, each headed by a pair of trustees, competed to raise the most money for the museum and to earn the highest point total in a "safari" walk around

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scenic Lake Los Carneros. After registration, each team was outfitted with a map, an "Emergency Survival Kit," and a Safari Journal, whose pages were completed as the teams encountered and mastered a series of six adventures during their park expedition. Near the midpoint, teams came to the "Trading Post," where they enjoyed cool refreshments served by volunteer Judy Savage and four-year old daughter, Leah, appropriately dressed in a lion costume.

Each safari began and ended with a ride on the "Jungle Train" which carried team members from the "Last Chance Outpost" embarkation point to a festively-decorated "Bwana Junction," their final destination, where participants enjoyed a potluck luncheon and

sharing tales of their exploits.

Winning teams and individuals will be announced and prizes awarded at the museum's June 15 meeting at Goleta Library. All museum members are invited to attend the 7:30 p.m. gathering and help honor all Safari participants.

#### Porter Collection Donated to Museum

The railroad museum has received a valuable collection of books from Josephine A. Millett of Santa Barbara. The 45 books, all on railroad subjects, are from the collection of the late John T. Porter, Mrs. Millett's father. John Porter and his wife, Esther Porter, who died last year, were longtime members and supporters of the South Coast Railroad Museum.

The jewel of the Porter family gift is a rare 19th century promotional booklet, entitled Wonderland '98, which the Northern Pacific Railway used to attract settlers to its lands. For its protection and conservation, the booklet will be added to the collection that the museum has established at the UCSB Library's Dept. of Special Collections.

All of the other books will be added to the railroad museum's library at Goleta Depot. Included are some of the most definitive works and recognizable titles — many out-of-print — on American railroading: John H.
