Depot Day Is Sept. 24

The 12th annual Depot Day, the South Coast railroad museum's major annual celebration, will be held

Saturday, Sept. 24.

Among the highlights of Depot Day '94 will be the official opening of the expanded Goleta Short Line, the museum's 7-1/2-inch-gauge railroad (see page 2 story). Four miniature locomotives, including two steamers and the museum's brand-new diesel-prototype S.P. yard engine (see page 3), will be on hand to haul passengers and join in the celebration.

Museum Will Develop Guide Program For Amtrak's Coast Starlight

Amtrak has invited our museum to develop an onboard guide program for the Coast Starlight, the daily train connecting Los Angeles and Seattle. The guide program will cover the portion of the Coast Starlight route between the cities of Oxnard and San Luis Obispo. As a first step toward the program's creation, Trustee Ben Beede and Museum Director Gary Coombs took the Santa Barbara-to-San Luis Obispo roundtrip on July 25, compliments of Amtrak.

The program will involve teams of two interpreterguides traveling aboard the Coast Starlight. Working from a prepared script, one of the guides will use the train's public-address system to interpret the area's natural, cultural, and historical sites and points of interest. The other team member will occupy the upper level of the lounge car, answering passenger questions and distributing literature, including brochures pertaining to regional resources and services of interest to

travelers.

Amtrak will cover most of the costs associated with the actual implementation of the guide program (ancillary travel, meals, overnight accommodations when necessary, etc.). The museum will train and use volunteers to staff the interpreter-guide teams, expanding the existing docent group for this purpose. "We expect to have the guide program operational by this time next year," Coombs said.

Onboard guide programs have been developed for other long-distance Amtrak trains by the U.S. Forest Service, California State Railroad Museum, and National Park Service. Navaho and other Native American guides interpret a portion of the route covered by Amtrak's Southwest Chief.

Another Miniature-Train Record Set

July ridership on the Goleta Short Line reached 1,964, smashing the single-month record of 1,702 set last July. Year-to-date passenger totals through July 31 on the miniature-train ride were 5,554, up 28% from 4,348 riders over the same period last year.

Sunday train operations, which began July 10, are doing well, averaging about 38 passengers daily over

the 2-3:30 p.m. schedule.

Upcoming Series Speakers Announced

On Wed., Sept. 21, local lecturer and history-buff Neal Graffy will present A Liar, a Drunk, and a Piano Teacher - The Story of the Flying A. The title of Graffy's talk and slide presentation refers to Santa Barbara's historic American Film Company. From 1912 to 1918, the "Flying A," as it was popularly known, was one of the largest motion picture studios in the U.S, producing more than 1,000 westerns, dramas, and comedies.

A local resident since 1961, Neal Graffy has writ-

ten and lectured on a number of Santa Barbara-area historical topics. This marks his third appearance in the museum's Continuing Lecture Series.

In honor of Halloween, Museum volunteer and retired railroader Tom Braunger will tell some Real Ghosts Stories, drawn from the annals of the Southern Pacific railroad, on Wed., Oct. 19. Many of you will recall Tom's thrilling talk on The Life of a Locomotive Engineer back in February 1993.

All Continuing Lecture Series programs are held at Goleta Library, 500 North Fairview Ave., and begin at 7:30 p.m. They are sponsored by the railroad museum and are free and open to the public. Refreshments and a social hour follow each presentation.

Museum volunteers have been hard at work building and laying new track for the Goleta Short Line miniature train. A target date of Depot Day (Sept. 24) has been set to complete the work, which will increase Short Line trackage by about 600 feet and will allow for the simultaneous operation of multiple trains.

Track workers include Jack Cogan, Scott Cogan, Ron Ferguson, Bill Parker, and Eugene Allen, who is supervising the overall effort.

Heumphreus Shares Modeling Know-How

One of the area's leading authorities on model railroading, Joe Heumphreus, owner of the Hobby Depot, gave a July 20 audience an hour-long overview of the subject. 

Rail Rides

operating passenger equipment in museum history, including our new diesel-prototype yard-engine and two miniature live-steam locomotives, Dan O'Brien's mogul visiting from El Monte and Gene Allen's American.

There will also be rides on the museum handcar and on Bob Mahan's "speeder," formerly with the Ventura County Railway, which makes a once-a-year appearance here every Depot Day. Rides are \$1 for the train and 50¢ for the handcar and speeder.
