Candy Cane Train Starts Nov. 25

On Friday, Nov. 25, the museum's miniature train will be transformed into the Candy Cane Train, specially decorated for the holiday season.

The Candy Cane Train will carry passengers daily through Dec. 24, except Mondays and Tuesdays, when the museum is closed. Hours of operation will be 2 'til 3:30 p.m. (1 to 4 on Saturdays).

Tickets for the Candy Cane Train are \$1.50 each for children or adults, which includes a train ride, holiday treat and favors. A three-ride ticket will also be available for \$2.75. All tickets will be sold at the museum during event hours.

Those attending the Candy Cane Train event will also be able to view the museum's holiday display, *Toy Trains and Teddy Bears!* (see page 4), which also opens Nov. 25.

Sweetheart Special Departs Feb. 11

The weekend of Feb. 11-12 has been set aside for the 1995 edition of the Sweetheart Special, the museum's popular Valentine's-theme trip to San Diego, first offered back in 1989.

The entire custom-class car on Amtrak's San Diegan has been reserved roundtrip for the museum group. Plenty of games, prizes, festive decorations, and other fun things are planned enroute.

The group will stay at the Bayside Inn, which is convenient to the Amtrak station as well as the attractions of downtown San Diego and the waterfront. A city trolley-bus tour and a Saturday-night group dinner are also being planned as trip options.

Costs are \$139 per person (double occupancy; \$159 single), which includes Saturday night accommodations, first-class rail fare, and transfers in San Diego.

In Memoriam: George H. Adams

The museum lost a devoted friend on Oct. 19 with the passing of **George Adams**. An original member of the Goleta Depot Committee, formed in 1980, Adams was an integral part of the effort to save and restore the historical landmark. He was a hard worker, whose dedication to purpose and unflagging good humor were personal trademarks.

Although he had lived in the Camarillo area for the past several years, George remained an active museum member, attending events and joining museum travel groups with his second wife, **Helen**.

The park recreational area adjoining the Goleta Depot grounds is named the George Adams Picnic Grove, honoring his long tenure as Santa Barbara County's first Parks Director and his many years of community service and activism.

George will be deeply missed. He was 85.

Train Discount Is New Member Benefit

Effective Jan. 1, all members will receive another new benefit: a 25¢ discount on every ticket purchased for the Goleta Short Line miniature-train. The new discount-ticket policy applies to tickets purchased for special events as well as regular operating days. It also covers both single- and multiple-ride tickets. Discount tickets may be used by the member or anyone accompanying the member to the museum, including friends and family. There is no limit on the number of tickets purchased, but all discount tickets must be used on the date of purchase. Discount tickets may not be re-sold.

Member Numbers Hit Record High

Museum membership has reached an all-time high. There are currently 310 members. The greatest growth has been in the Junior Engineers Club, which now comprises about 24% of the total membership.

Library Program Concludes

On Oct. 30, the museum wrapped up another year of participation in the Summer Reading Program of the Santa Barbara Public Libraries. In recognition of reading achievement by children enrolled in the reading program, the museum gave 375 free rides on the Goleta Short Line miniature railroad over the July-October period. This is more than double the number of rides given during last year's program.

The reading program is open to children ages 2-14 throughout most of Santa Barbara County, including Santa Barbara, Goleta, Carpinteria, and Montecito.

The museum's involvement this year was made

possible by the financial support of Mid-State Bank.

Basic Dues Rate Increased

Members who renew at the Active Member level will now be paying \$15 annually, an increase of \$5 over the previous rate. This is the first time that the museum's basic membership rate has been raised since the museum was established in 1983.

Like the X-2000 and the German ICE train, the TALGO is being evaluated by Amtrak for possible intercity use.

A collection of 27 railroad books has been given to the museum library by Louise Lusk of Carpinteria. Titles included in the gift are second printings of S. Kip Farrington, Jr.'s Railroads at War, published in 1944, and James Marshall's Santa Fe: The Railroad that Built an Empire, which first appeared in 1945.

New Engine Shines On Depot Day

The museum's new diesel-prototype miniature locomotive was put into active service on Depot Day, Sept. 24. Assigned number 2655, after an actual Southern Pacific yard engine, the new engine received final detailing and lettering a scant few days before Depot Day, compliments of Freedom Signs, operated by Betsy Harris and Suzy Williams.

No. 2655 joined **Gene Allen**'s American and **Dan O'Brien**'s mogul in hauling passengers throughout the day. It was the first time that old No. 1316, the museum's first engine and sister to No. 2655, was able to rest on a day of train operations. Since being placed into service in 1989, No. 1316 has pulled trains carrying more than 30,000 total passengers.

Depot Day also marked the grand opening of the expanded Goleta Short Line which our volunteers had been working on for several months. The new route, which includes about 600 feet of additional track, allows us to operate multiple trains at the same time.

The augmented system performed flawlessly on Depot Day. Final testing of the trackage and switches, including the first carrying of revenue passengers, had been conducted on Sept. 21 and 23.

Those who have ridden the Short Line both before and after the improvements can attest to the added enjoyment of the ride experience. A debt of gratitude is owed to all those who worked on the track project, especially Jack Cogan and Ron Ferguson, who built most of the track, and layout designer Gene Allen. Also contributing significantly to the effort were Scott Cogan, Scott Davis, Leo Diaz, and Bill Parker.



Contributions are deductible from state and federal income taxes. mile journey. We'll travel from Bombay to Calcutta; turn south to Vishakapatnam on the Indian Ocean; then cross the Deccan plateau. Along the way, we'll ride crowded commuter trains; visit Princely State Railways, built as playthings for maharajahs; and tour villages encountered enroute. A detour north takes us into Nepal, to ride its only railroad, and then to one of the railway wonders of the world — the incomparable Darjeeling Himalaya route.

Rich Thom has ridden and photographed the railways of over 30 countries, concentrating on India and South America. He writes regularly for *International*

Railway Traveler magazine.

Earthquakes vs. Trains will be the subject of a Wednesday, Feb. 15 talk by Robert McNeel. The 30-minute program will feature slides showing the harm that earthquakes can bring to railroads — damaging tracks, overturning trains, and disrupting rail operations. Focusing on Callifornia, the presentation will cover most of the 20th century, from the San Francisco Earthquake of 1906 to the 1994 Northridge quake.

A local authority on railroad history, McNeel spent all of his working life, more than four decades, in close association with railroads — as an S.P. engineman, rail-tour escort, owner-operator of a local rail-travel

service, and Amtrak ticket agent.

All Continuing Lecture Series programs are held at Goleta Library, 500 North Fairview Ave., and begin at 7:30 p.m. They are sponsored by the railroad museum and are free and open to the public. Refreshments and a social hour follow each presentation.
