Santa Barbara Foundation Awards Grant to Museum

The railroad museum has received a \$2,210 grant from the Santa Barbara Foundation. About 75% of the grant funds will be used for the purchase of drain pipe to improve the drainage of the museum grounds and to protect Goleta Depot, the museum's historical and architectural centerpiece. The remainder of the grant was used to purchase a fax machine/copier for the museum office.

The Santa Barbara Foundation has been a longtime supporter of the railroad museum and Institute for American Research programs and activities. In the early 1980s, the Foundation was a major benefactor of the Goleta Depot Project to save and restore the historical landmark.

Argentina Is Nov. 15 Program Focus

International rail traveler Rich Thom will present a multi-media program on the "Railways of Patagonia" at a Wednesday, Nov. 15 edition of the

museum's Continuing Lecture Series.

The armchair tour begins in Buenos Aires, crossing the pampas region aboard one of Argentina's last long-distance trains to the resort of Bariloche. Next, its on to the Esquel Branch and the weekly all-steam mixed-train, the *Patagonian Express*, popularized by writer Paul Theroux. Finally, we travel to Argentina's extreme south, to ride another steam-powered line, the Rio Turbio, the southernmost railway in the world.

Rich Thom has ridden and photographed the railways of over 30 countries, concentrating on South America and India. He writes regularly for *Interna*tional Railway Traveler magazine, This will mark his third appearance before a South Coast Railroad

Museum audience.

All Continuing Lecture Series programs are held at Goleta Library, 500 North Fairview Ave., and begin at 7:30 p.m. They are sponsored by the railroad museum and are free and open to the public. Refreshments and a social hour follow each presentation.

The 13th Annual Depot Day celebration will be held Sunday, Sept. 24, from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Made possible by members and friends, Depot Day is the museum's big annual fundraising event.

□ Rail Rides

Following a Depot Day tradition, rail rides will highlight this year's festivities. Two miniature trains will operate throughout much of the day on the



Goleta Short Line. Motive power will be supplied by Gene Allen's steamer, as well as the museum's pair of diesel-prototype vard-engines.

There will also be rides on the museum handcar and on Bob Mahan's "speeder," formerly with the Ventura County Railway, which makes a once-a-year appearance here every Depot Day. Rides are \$1 for the train and 50¢ for the handcar and speeder.

Donation Requested

A \$1 donation per person will be requested upon admission to Depot Day. Members may elect to make this donation if they wish.

Musical Entertainment

The Bluescasters will be on hand to provide lively music, featuring vocals by lead singer Sabine. Those who attended this year's Easter Bunny Express will no doubt recall the Bluescaster's great sound.
