China Is Oct. 16 Program Topic

International rail traveler **Rich Thom**, now a member of the South Coast Railroad Museum Board of Trustees, will share highlights of his recent rail travels in China at an Oct. 16 installment of the museum's Continuing Lecture Series.

Rich Thom's multi-media presentation, provocatively titled China: The Final Chapter, tells how the "final chapter" of steam-hauled trains in regular mainline service is being played out in China, the last country on earth to build and use these magnificent

machines in significant numbers.

The presentation is based on over 11,000 kilometers of rail travel completed by Thom in three Asian trips during 1995 and 1996, spanning the country from north to south, from the Russian border in Inner Mongolia to Zhanjiang on the South China Sea, plus an additional route westward along the Yellow River to the seldom-visited NingXia Autonomous Region. Sights along the way range from steelworks and mines to more familiar tourist attractions, to myriad railroad scenes that capture the sunset of the steam era.

Rich Thom has ridden and photographed the rail-

ways of over 30 countries, concentrating on South America, India, and China. He writes regularly for *International Railway Traveler* magazine. This will mark his fourth appearance before a South Coast Railroad Museum audience.

All Continuing Lecture Series programs are held at Goleta Library, 500 North Fairview Ave., and begin at 7:30 p.m. They are sponsored by the railroad museum and are free and open to the public. Refreshments and a social hour follow each presentation.

"Steaming Summer" Draws Big Crowd

The 1996 edition of Another Steaming Summer was a marked departure from its predecessors. More publicity and more equipment, of both the operating and display varieties, meant better attendance and lots more for our visitors to do.

Many took advantage of the privilege of enjoying the rides as often as they liked for the \$2,50 admission price. The result: ridership soared to 1,090, including 930 rides on the Goleta Short Line and the balance on the museum handcar. In terms of train ridership, it was the second busiest weekend in museum history, falling only 23 rides short of the record set during the 1994 Goleta Lemon Festival.

The bulk of the work both days was performed by Gene Allen's 4-6-0 American and Ed Winnewisser's 0-6-0 switcher. Each steamer usually pulled its own two-car train, but sometimes they doubleheaded to haul five passenger cars together. No. 2655, one of the museum's diesel-prototype switchers, played a supporting role — moving cars about in the yard, or acting in the capacity of a helper when only one steamer was available to pull a five-car train. On Saturday, Ron Ferguson and Pete Thorp steamed up their moguls, both of which saw limited service on longer multi-engine trains during the day.

Art and Barbara Reiter came down from Atascadero to share their wrecking train, a six-foot-long scale-model complete with an operating steampowered crane. And, Jim Marchiando was on hand with his steam plant, helping to keep the air filled with the sounds of steam whistles and powering a water pump and a variety of smaller mechanical devices demonstrated by Jim Higman.

Operating model steam engines and equipment on

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display during Steaming Summer included the South Coast Railroad Museum's Little Engines American, plus a three-truck "Climax" logging locomotive and an American La-France horse-drawn steam-pumper fire

engine, both supplied by Gene Allen.

Thanks are owed to these individuals, and to the many others who helped to make the event possible. We commend the Goleta Lions for their support again this year. The tri-tip sandwiches and hot dogs were delicious and the sale proceeds will be put to good use by the museum. Thanks especially to the Lions' cooking-and-booth crew: John Adam, Mark Bottiani, George Dussualt, Bob Lehman, Lions President Bob Mangus, Food Chairman Bob Parker, Ron Plourde, Harry Reed, Jack Rutten, and Tom Tuck-

Thanks also to all of the museum's rank-and-file volunteers, who performed their ordinary staffing chores under extraordinary circumstances: Julianne Bentley, Edee Brown, and Stella Kramer in the Trackside Shop; Bob Burtness, Ed Leska, Bruce Morden, and Hilda Volkman serving as depot "agents"; Neil Fetter sharing the model-railroad exhibit; and Bruce Morden and Bill Parker operating the handcar ride.

It was great to have an old friend back for the weekend: Steve Kramer, who was one of our most accomplished miniature-train steam-engineers in the late '80s, was on hand throughout the event to help run

Gene's engine.

Members of the museum Board of Trustees performed the bulk of the admissions-table duties. They included President Ben Beede, Mike Couch, Mike Gartzke, John Locke, Dick Shelton, Lani Strobel, and Rich Thom - again, with help from Bruce Mor-

Assistant Director Phyllis Olsen served as floater throughout the event, while Director Gary Coombs functioned as senior train dispatcher and occasional conductor or diesel engineer on the Goleta Short Line.

To protect the equipment and event materials left on the grounds, members of the Beede, Morden, and Saragosa families shared sentry duty, camping overnight on Friday and Saturday.

Local musician Steve McPeters graciously donated several hours of his time on Sunday afternoon, entertaining the crowd with his fine vocal, guitar, and

banjo renditions of a variety of popular songs.

Special acknowledgment should be made of those who graciously assisted museum staff with the arduous cleanup chores after the event: Gene Allen, Ron Ferguson, Jim Higman, and Steve Kramer.

Finally, Steaming Summer wouldn't exist without the continuing support of event sponsor Toyota of Santa Barbara and owner Denny Franks. Thanks, Denny, for all of your help over the years.

Miniature-Train Yard Upgraded

To enable Steaming Summer to expand this year, it was necessary to make a number of improvements to the Goleta Short Line's boarding area and yard. These included the addition of a third yard track, switch, and switch-stand - to facilitate the movement of trains plus two extra leads to the turntable - for rollingstock storage and steaming-up and displaying the locomotives. The expanded yard was designed by Gene Allen, who was assisted in the construction by Ed Winnewisser and Ron Ferguson. Bruce Morden and his family assisted with some last-minute ballasting on the eve of Steaming Summer.

Museum Will Be In AAA's '97 TourBook

Our museum has been chosen as a featured attraction in the American Automobile Association's 1997 California/Nevada Tourbook. AAA estimates that about 4 million copies of the new TourBook will be distributed next year to its members through more than 1,000 district-office locations throughout the United States.

The railroad museum first appeared in AAA's TourBook in 1994. It was the first time that a Goleta Valley attraction had been listed there since the 1970s.
