Candy Cane Train Begins Nov. 29

The 4th annual Candy Cane Train pulls out of the station on Friday, Nov. 29, with operations daily through Sunday, Dec. 22, except Mondays and Tuesdays when the museum is closed. Event hours will be 1 to 4 p.m. on weekends and 2 to 4 p.m. weekdays.

Candy Cane Train tickets are \$1.75 each for children or adults, which includes a train ride, holiday treat, and favors. A three-ride ticket will be available for \$3.00. Museum members will receive their customary 25¢ discount on all tickets puchased. Tickets will be sold at the museum during event hours.

Neal Graffy To Discuss Historic Santa Barbara Earthquake

On Wednesday, Feb. 19, local historian and lecturer Neal Graffy will present 19 Seconds At 6.3 – The Great Quake of 1925, as part of the railroad museum's Continuing Lecture Series. The slide show and talk will recount how at 6:42 a.m. on June 29, 1925 a sleepy Santa Barbara was jolted awake by a major earthquake. The temblor's devastation would help to transform the town from an architectural hodgepodge into one of the most beautiful cities in the world.

Graffy is chairman of the Santa Barbara County

Landmarks Committee, on which he has served since 1991. He joined the Santa Barbara Historical Society Board of Trustees in 1993. He has penned several short works on local history subjects, including Naples: The City By The Sea, The Masini Adobe, and The Ortega Adobe At Arroyo Quemada.

This will mark Graffy's fourth appearance before a railroad museum audience. Earlier program topics included Santa Barbara's historic Potter Hotel, the silent-era Flying A film studios, and a comparative,

Santa Barbara: Then And Now.

All Continuing Lecture Series programs are held at Goleta Library, 500 North Fairview Ave., and begin at 7:30 p.m. They are free and open to the public. Refreshments and a social hour follow each series presentation.

"Super Saturday" Coming Jan. 25

The museum will be giving free rides on the Goleta Short Line miniature train to all visitors on Saturday, Jan. 25. There will be no restriction on the number of rides per person. However, all riders must be at least 34 inches tall and must meet the train ride's other requirements.

Thom Shares Chinese Rail Experiences

Continuing Lecture Series attendees were treated to a multimedia presentation on the railroads of mainland China by international rail traveler Rich Thom. The Oct. 16 program, sponsored by the railroad museum and held at Goleta Library, was based on three trips to China taken by Thom in 1995-96 and featured authentic music and sound images, some extraordinary slide photography, and live first-hand narrative. Appropriately titled China: The Final Chapter, the colorful and highly informative presentation emphasized that this was the sunset of steam railroading in China, the last country on earth to build and use steam locomotives in significant numbers.

Santa Barbara Foundation Supports Drainage Project

A potential solution to a serious drainage problem at the railroad museum has been implemented, thanks to the Santa Barbara Foundation and two county-government agencies. The foundation provided the museum with the grant funds necessary to purchase about 200 feet of high-capacity drain pipe which was installed by a County Parks Dept. crew, using fill dirt supplied by County Flood Control. front of Goleta Depot.

Over the years, water action had eroded and deepened the ditch, creating a safety hazard. The pipe project not only has removed this hazard, correcting a troublesome drainage problem in the process, but also has significantly enhanced the appearance of the museum grounds.
