In Memoriam: Raymond E. Baird

Goleta Depot has lost one of its most beloved and valued friends. **Raymond E. Baird**, architect of the Goleta Depot preservation project, died Dec. 22.

Ray Baird was one of five original members of the Goleta Depot Committee, which was charged with developing and implementing the plan to save the historical landmark. He was indispensable to that effort — combining his considerable talents as a professional architect, his willingness to commit hundreds of hours over several years to project planning and supervision, and his wonderful wit and indefatigable good humor.

For his tireless efforts, Baird, together with eight depot-project colleagues, received the 1984 Golden Deed Award, Goleta's highest community-service accolade. His name appears on the commemorative bronze plaque that greets museum visitors from the great rock along the entry walk; from the same vantage point, the more discerning eye will also see Ray's initials, "REB," personally etched into once-soft concrete adjoining the loading dock on the depot's north end.

Ray and his wife, **Shirley**, remained good friends of the museum over the years. The Bairds helped to found the Endowment Fund in 1988 and were charter members of the Milepost 100 support group.

Ray Baird will be deeply missed.

Easter Bunny Visits March 29

The 5th Annual Easter Bunny Express, one of the museum's most eagerly-awaited family events, will be held on Saturday, March 29, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Those holding the event's egg-shaped tickets may participate in a variety of activities, including scheduled stops at Wabbit-Twacks Station (to board the museum's miniature train for a 1/3-mile ride around the grounds); Harvey's House (where a cookie and beverage await); Easter-Bunnyville (to meet the Easter Bunny and select an egg surprise); Jack-Rabbit Junction (to enter a drawing for some marvelous gifts); and What's Up Dock (to collect another event souvenir).

Tickets are \$2.75 for children and \$2.25 for adults (adult tickets do not include the What's Up Dock and

Easter-Bunnyville activities).

Tickets will be available at the museum during the event until 3:30 p.m.; or they may be purchased in advance during museum hours (Wed.-Sun., 1-4 p.m.). Members of the **Goleta Lions Club** will be helping out again this year, selling hot sandwiches and other refreshments, with all proceeds benefitting the museum. So please plan to join us for lunch and support the Lions' participation!

Hop aboard the Easter Bunny Express on March 29. It promises to be another hare-raising eggsperience for the whole family! If it rains on March 29,

the event will be moved to Saturday, April 5.

Annual Dinner Will Be May 29

For the second year, the Annual Dinner will be held at the **Timbers Restaurant**, 10 Wincester Canyon Rd. in Goleta, on Thursday, May 29.

A no-host social hour will begin at 6 p.m., with dinner at 7. To encourage your attendance, the ticket price has been kept at the museum's cost — only \$13.50 per person, which covers the complete buffet-style meal (both roast beef and chicken breast will be served), dinner beverage, dessert, sales tax and tip. "Great Rail Race" Set For May 17

The museum's spring fundraiser, which celebrates its 16th anniversary this year, takes on a new look for 1997 — becoming the "Great Goleta Rail Race". Reminiscent of the legendary saga of John Henry, the Great Goleta Rail Race will offer its own version of the epic struggle between man and machine, as the people-powered museum handcar and the Goleta Short Line miniature-train compete to determine which can complete the greatest number of passenger-miles over a three-hour period.

On Saturday, May 17 between 1 and 4 p.m., both the handcar and train will operate continuously, giving free rides to all visitors. Careful record will be kept of the total passengers carried and distance completed by each conveyance. The winner will be determined based on these totals, adjusted using a handicap that will be calculated by several local high-school math classes (At the same time, the classes, themselves, will be compet-

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ing to determine which can do the best job of coming up with the most accurate handicap figures.).

Museum members, as well as the general public, are cordially invited to attend, not merely to observe the unfolding spectacle, but to actively join in as riderparticipants. At the event, you, your family members, and friends may throw your support behind either the handcar or train, simply by riding that vehicle once or as often as you like; or, you may use the opportunity to enjoy the free rides on both the train and handcar, All riders will receive a certificate acknowledging their *Great Race* participation.

The museum's normal, slow operating speeds will be maintained throughout the event on both rides. Train riders must be at least 34 inches tall; the handcar ride has a 48-inch height requirement.

In addition to the day's fun, the *Great Goleta Rail* Race also has a serious side. The spring fundraiser is one of the railroad museum's most important annual income sources, generating more than 10% of all monies needed for operations. Funds are raised by many of the event participants, including members of the Board of Trustees, who obtain financial pledges from sponsors, including area businesses, organizations, members, families, and individuals. Money raised from the event will be used not only to underwrite general museum operations, but also to sponsor three days of free miniature-train rides during 1997, including the *Great Race* day, itself, plus two additional free days in late July and early November.

Everyone who becomes an event sponsor, with a tax-deductible gift of \$10 or more, or who obtains pledges totalling \$50 or more, will be named in the list of *Great Goleta Rail Race* supporters, which will be prominently displayed at the museum during all three free days and for at least one week preceeding the July and November free days.

You are urged to assist in the fundraising effort, either by making a personal donation or seeking contributions from others. In any case, please come out on May 17 and join the fun! Mark the date on your calendar now.

Chamber Supports Brochure Distribution

A debt of gratitude is owed to the Goleta Valley Chamber of Commerce for approving the use of about \$1,500 of County of Santa Barbara bed-tax monies to print 10,000 copies of the new museum brochure and to pay for its distribution in racks in area hotels and visitor spots.

The Goleta Chamber has helped to promote our efforts since the project to save Goleta Depot began in 1980, largely in the form of advertising support under the auspices of the chamber's Tourism Committee.

Ride and Visitor Records Set

Last year marked the first time that the museum handcar carried more than 1,000 riders. This achievement would not have been possible without the efforts (continued on page 4)

It was also a record year for total museum visitors, estimated at over 19,000 for the 12 months, and on the Goleta Short Line, which carried 12,665 miniature-

train passengers around the grounds.

Tuohy Foundation Grant Received

The railroad museum has been awarded a 1997 grant from the Alice Tweed Tuohy Foundation. The \$400 grant will be used to purchase of a communications modem and data-storage equipment for the

museum computer.

The Tuohy Foundation has been a longtime railroad museum supporter. Last year, a Tuohy grant made possible a comprehensive accessibility study of the museum's programs and facilities. And, in the 1980s, a two-year grant from the foundation covered the purchase of all of the equipment, materials, and supplies used in the construction of the model-railroad exhibit, Railroading On The South Coast.

Graffy Rocks Quake Audience

It was another earth-shaking performance from local historian and lecturer Neal Graffy, who spoke Wednesday, Feb. 19 before an appreciative audience of 40-plus, composed about equally of museum members and representatives from the general public. The amply-illustrated presentation, 19 Seconds At 6.3 – The Great Quake of 1925, was Graffy's fourth contribution to the railroad museum's Continuing Lecture Series, a free quarterly program.

House Track Extended

A short addition of about 22 feet has been made to the standard-gauge "house track" in front of the depot, north of the caboose. This extension will allow us to move the caboose a few feet to provide our visitors with a more unobstructed view of the building's handsome front architecture.

The track-laying project was organized by **Gene Allen** and carried out by County SWAP workers assigned to the museum. The rail and some of the ties were obtained by donation in the late 1980s.
