Author To Discuss And Sign New Book on Railroad Women At Nov. 19 Event

"She's Been Working On The Railroad"

Do you know about the crucial jobs that women have filled down through the years to keep America's railroads running smoothly?

You can find out on Wednesday, Nov. 19, when author Nancy Smiler Levinson comes to town to discuss and autograph her new book, She's Been Working On The Railroad. This latest edition of the railroad museum's Continuing Lecture Series takes places at Goleta Library, 500 North Fairview Ave., beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Off the press in October, She's Been Working On The Railroad has already received some important recognition, including selection by the Women's National Book Association as one of "Eighty Books for 21st Century Girls" and by the American Booksellers Assn. as a "Pick of the List" for Fall '97.

Levinson's presentation will focus on the fascinating story of the women who have worked on railroads, from the 1830s to the present day, including their struggle against stereotyping and prejudice to win the right to work as they choose. She will also share in slide form many of the historical and contemporary photographic images which were compiled for the book by **Shirley Burman**, who rail fans and history buffs may recognize

from her traveling exhibition, Women and the American Railroad. Burman's husband is the noted railroad photographer, Richard Steinheimer.

Copies of She's Been Working On The Railroad will be available at the event for purchase and signing by the author. Refreshments will be served following the presentation.

"Candy Cane Train" Begins Nov. 28

The 5th annual "Candy Cane Train," the railroad museum's popular year-end family event, begins Friday, Nov. 28, continuing daily through Dec. 24 (except Mondays and Tuesdays when the museum is closed). Event hours are 1 to 4 p.m. on weekends and 2 to 4 p.m. on weekdays.

Candy Cane Train tickets are \$1.50 for adults and \$2.50 for children, which includes a ride on the festively-decorated miniature train, and an assortment of holiday treats and favors. Two-ride tickets will be available for an additional 50¢ each. Museum members receive their customary 25¢ discount on all tickets purchased. Tickets will be sold at the museum during event hours.

Those attending the Candy Cane Train event will be able to enjoy the museum's holiday display, Toy Trains and Teddy Bears! (see story on page 3), also opening Nov. 28.

Museum Receives IMLS Grant

The South Coast Railroad Museum has been awarded an \$18,000 General Operating Support Grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS, formerly Institute of Museum Services), a federal agency serving the nation's museums and libraries. IMLS grants are given annually on the basis of a nationwide competition open to museums of all sizes and types, from art museums to zoos. This year, only 202 grants were awarded nationwide, from among more than 1,000 applicants.

The South Coast Railroad Museum was one of only two rail museums to receive a grant and was the smallest of 16 California recipients. This marks the 10th consecutive year that our museum has received this prestigious award — a feat which only a handful of museums across the nation have accomplished.

"To qualify, museums receiving operating support must demonstrate outstanding performance in all areas of museum operations," according to IMLS Director Diane Frankel. Museum Director Gary Coombs commented, "We are honored to have been singled out for recognition again this year. The IMLS grant is a badge of excellence that can be shared by everyone who helps to make the railroad museum a success — all of our volunteers, members, staff, contributors, and supporters, throughout the community and beyond."

Construction Begins

Grand Opening Being Planned

Work on the new Goleta Amtrak station has begun. According to Robert Crego, District Manager for Amtrak West, the platform at the Goleta facility could be ready as early as mid-December, at least for those passengers who use the trains going on to San Luis Obispo. Other San Diegan trains will continue to terminate at Santa Barbara until the layout track at Goleta is completed.

The railroad museum and Goleta Valley Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with Amtrak, are now in the process of planning a grand opening ceremony, which will probably be set for a weekend day sometime following the commencement of passenger service.

Since these events are likely to take place before the next *Depot Dispatch* issue, readers may wish to follow the local newspapers and broadcast media for updated information. Or, feel free to call the museum (805-964-3540) for an update.

Earlier projections from Amtrak that the Goleta station would be completed by the end of October have proven incorrect. Initial delays involved the Union Pacific Railroad, which recently acquired the Southern Pacific Railroad, including the Coast Route through Santa Barbara County. Completion of the layover track at Goleta has been held up pending a final agreement for service from the Goleta Water District.

Cox Renews Support Of Youth-Program

Children who tour the historic Goleta
Depot with their school class or youth
organization will again be able to take a
free ride on the Goleta Short Line,
compliments of Cox Communications.
In September, Cox renewed its support of
the educational program designed to
encourage greater participation in the
museum's tours for children. This is the
fifth year of program sponsorship by Cox
Communications.

Over the past year alone, the free program has benefitted hundreds of local children, representing public and private schools and youth groups from Goleta, Santa Barbara, Montecito, and Carpinteria.

Foundation Awards Grant To Museum

The museum has received a capitalenhancement grant from the Wood-Claeyssens Foundation. The \$8,600 award will be used to cover about 30% of the costs of the proposed improvements to the museum grounds, which were described in a report in the Fall '97 issue of the Depot Dispatch.

The proposed grounds plan includes four elements: (1) construction of a new museum entry structure, patterned after a country rail passenger stop, which visitors will pass through as they enter the museum grounds; (2) resurfacing of pathways between the depot and miniature-train boarding area for improved accessibility, especially for visitors in wheelchairs; (3) construction of a group-picnic area, to accommodate better the museum's usage for birthday parties and other public group gatherings; and; (4) installation of additional wooden post-and-rail fencing near the museum's eastern border, to provide greater visitor safety, especially with regard to the miniature train.

The County Parks Commission gave

in-concept approval for the grounds project in July. The proposal was developed by the museum's Planning Committee and staff, with input from the general membership at a special April 16 meeting.

This is the first grant from the Santa Barbara-based foundation that the railroad museum has received. Three other local foundations have been contacted regarding grants to make up the remaining \$20,000 needed to complete the \$28,600 project.

Depot Tree Celebrates The Holiday Season

The Goleta Depot tree will be lighted every night in December, creating an enchanting Victorian scene that you and your family and friends may enjoy as you travel past the museum grounds on Los Carneros Road.

The decorated tree, which each year occupies the historical landmark's second-floor window bay, has special significance for the Yuletide. It preserves the custom, practiced over the years by countless rail-station agent families across America, of placing their Christmas tree in a prominent spot, where its message of hope and wonder could be shared with passengers and crews on passing trains.
