## **Visitor Center Ready**

### **Grand Opening Nov 18-19**

The long-awaited Visitor Center is finished at last! On the weekend of Nov. 18-19, the museum will hold a Grand Opening to celebrate the achievement. Those dates were selected because they also mark the 25th anniversary of the relocation of Goleta Depot from the railroad tracks to Lake Los Carneros County Park.

We'll have 25-cent train rides (Yes, that means members ride free – with valid membership card.), prize drawings and a lot more. Bring a bandana so you can signal and board the train at either of two flagstops set up especially for the occasion. Be one of the first to sign the new electronic guestbook in the Visitor Center.

Please join us in cheering the completion of the largest capital project in the history of the museum. Event hours are 1 to 4 p.m. each day.

The end of another year is drawing to a close, which means it won't be long before the *Candy Cane Train* takes over the museum tracks for another season filled with holiday merriment. The ever-popular event opens Friday, Nov. 24 — the day after Thanksgiving — and continues daily through Christmas Eve (except Nov. 27-28 and Dec. 4-5 and Dec. 11-12, when the

museum will be closed). During the week before Christmas, the museum will be open two additional days — Monday & Tuesday, Dec. 18 & 19 — to allow the Candy Cane Train to run a couple of extra days while schools are out for the holidays.

The event has changed very little since 1993, when it was called the "Holiday Train." The name was changed to *Candy Cane Train* the following year. Ticket bearers receive a ride on the festively decorated train and an assortment of holiday treats and favors — including, of course, a candy cane!

Hours are 1 to 4 p.m. each day, but event-goers are always urged to plan on arriving at the museum not later than 3:30, in order to enjoy all of the *Candy Cane Train* activities at an unhurried pace. You'll want to include enough time to enjoy the traditional *Toy Trains & Teddy Bears* display in the Freight Office, which also opens on No-

# Museum Tree Renews A Hallowed Tradition In American Railroading

Feb. 3 will mark the first weekend day of free miniature-train rides at the museum, as we celebrate another "*Super Saturday!*" event. Hours are 1 to 4 p.m.

Super Saturday is always held on the day before the Super Bowl football game. This will be the 11th annual Super Saturday, since the museum's event was inaugurated 30 years after the Super Bowl, which celebrates its 41st anniversary in 2007 (Do the math: XLI - XXX = XI).



# Museum Seeks Volunteers For Coast Starlight Rail Program

Volunteers are now being recruited for the museum's interpretive program aboard Amtrak's *Coast Starlight* trains.

The program will start another busy year of trips to San Luis Obispo and Oakland in mid-February. Over the past year, the museum's volunteers made 143 presentations aboard *Coast Starlight* trains, reaching an audience of about 32,600 rail passengers.

Persons interested in taking part in the program during 2007 should plan to attend a required day-long orientation and training session on Saturday, Feb. 10. This training is only offered once a year. After one additional evening class, guide-recruits will begin on-the-job training aboard the *Coast Starlight*, working with senior guides and members of the museum staff.

## "Toy Trains & Teddy Bears" Display Shares Keepsakes For The Holidays


