# Another Steaming Summer

Once every year, for two decades now, members and friends have been bringing their miniature steam locomotives to the museum for a special event called "Steaming Summer." These remarkable machines pull the trains of the



Goleta Short Line, hauling passengers and showing off their amazing power and intricate design. The result is one of the railroad museum's most popular annual events.

The 20th *Steaming Sum-mer* will be held over the weekend of July 28-29.

Visiting locomotives will include **Gene Allen's** 4-4-0 American, **Ed Winnewisser's** 0-6-0 switcher (both shown on these pages), and others.

A major addition and highlight of this year's event will be the expanded Goleta Short Line track, which now gives passengers a wonderful nine-minute ride that is nearly one-

half-mile in length.

The event will again feature a circus theme, with cars from **Ted Cheesman**'s circus train added to one of the consists, including two *Steaming Summer* favorites — a car with water-squirting-elephants and a musical calliope car with a bubble-blowing bear.

In the model-railroad exhibit, the circus train from **Ken** and **Carolyn Weber's** "K&C Famous Family Circus" will

reprise its travels around the "Goleta Loop," adding to the circus theme. The Weber circus first entertained *Steaming Summer* attendees in 1999.

Jim Marchiando will be back with his steam plant, powering a wa-

ter pump, a table-top display of operating steam tools and machines, and a phalanx of steam whistles.

Daily admission to *Steaming Summer* is \$4 (\$3.75 for members), which includes unlimited train and handcar rides (Riders must meet the museum's minimum-height requirements: 34" for the train; 48" for the handcar.).

Hours both days will be 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Museum members are invited to come early — between 10 and 11 a.m. — to watch as the locomotives are being steamed-up in preparation for the day (Early admission is a special benefit of membership. It is open only to members and their accompanying guests, please.)

## New Track Opening & Free Rides Made Rotary Day A Big Hit

The 7th annual *Rotary Day*, held Saturday June 16, served up some real treats for those lucky enough to attend the free event sponsored each year at this time by the **Rotary Club of Goleta Noontime**.

The museum used the occasion to inaugurate passenger service on the expanded Goleta Short Line miniature railroad. To add to the festivities, **Gene Allen** brought his 4-4-0 American locomotive to help diesel engine No. 1316 haul passengers. The Allen steamer was also in a special banner-cutting ceremony to officially open the new track (see photo sequence at right). Two trains were operated simultaneously for most of the afternoon and those aboard had great fun waving to one another whenever the trains crossed paths.

Riders had lots of good things to say about the new, longer ride. Nearly a halfmile in length now, the ride takes about nine minutes from start to finish.

Special thanks are owed not only to the Rotary Club, itself, but also to Rotarians **Michael Gartzke**, **Sandy Stanbrough**, and **Walt Stephens**, for help-



ing to keep the handcar running throughout the event. Gartzke, a former member of the museum's Board

of Trustees, has been instrumental in keeping Rotary Day alive and helping with event planning and coordination.


Overall, more than 250 free train and handcar rides were given to visitors during a busy and eventful afternoon.

During the June 16 ceremony in which the expanded track of the Goleta Short Line was officially opened, those who contributed to the project were recognized. Financial support came from three local foundations, the Alice Tweed Tuohy Foundation, the Santa Barbara Foundation, and the Wood-Claeyssens Foundation. Substantial contributions in the form of donated trackbuilding supplies also were made to the project by Allen Models, Inc.

But the unquestionable heroes of the trackwork that has transformed the museum train ride are the volunteer "Gandy Dancers" who toiled uncounted hours over many months to bring the project to fruition.

Gene Allen led the way, teaching his fellow workers how to build and lay track, supervising their labors, and

making sure everything was right. Ed Leska became Gene's right-hand man, staying with the project from start to finish, and becoming a skilled right-of-way engineer in the process. John Green, Bruce Morden, William Simpson, and Bern Verbit contributed many of their valued mornings to the effort. Noel Langle cut about 1,000 ties — for the switches and crossovers and to support

the rails everywhere in between. Also giving time were Ron Bruns, Cayce Baierski, and Seth Olitzky.

The result of all these efforts is the veritable rebirth of the Goleta Short Line, from little more than a "kiddie

ride" to a memorable ride experience that is almost a half-mile in length and about nine minutes in duration. In

The admission charge applies to everyone, including those who choose not to ride. Infants and any others who are unable to ride the train will be admitted at no charge. For late arrivals, the admission price will be lowered to \$3

after 3 p.m, about the time the steamers are retiring for the day. Advance tickets, at 50¢ off (75¢ off with membership card) are now available in the museum's Visitor Center.

During the event there will be tri-tip sandwiches, "Depot Dogs" and beverages available for purchase.
