Sandy Sane Frain Aprives

One of the museum's most popular annual events opens Friday, Nov. 23, the day after Thanksgiving, when the *Candy Cane Train* begins its traditional four-week holiday-season run. The event continues daily through Dec. 23 (except Nov. 26-27, Dec. 3-4, and Dec. 10-11, when the museum will be closed). During the week before Christmas, the museum will be open two additional days — Monday & Tuesday, Dec. 17 -18 — to allow the *Candy Cane Train* to run a couple of extra days while some of the area schools are closed for their holiday breaks.

Ticket bearers receive a ride on the decorated train, featuring the event's hallmark red-and-white striped passenger cars, and an assortment of holiday treats and favors — including the oversized souvenir tickets and, of course, a candy cane!


Hours are 1 to 4 p.m. each day, but event-goers are always urged to plan on arriving at the museum not later than 3:30, in order to enjoy all of the *Candy Cane Train* activities at an unhurried pace. You'll want to include enough time to enjoy the traditional *Toy Trains & Teddy Bears* display in the Waiting Room, which also opens on Nov. 24.

Candy Cane Train tickets, at \$3.50 each, will be sold at the museum during event hours. Additional rides may be purchased for \$1 each. Museum members receive their usual 25¢ off on every ticket purchased.

For our guests' safety, the 34-inch minimum-height requirement applies to all *Candy Cane Train* passengers.

John Green welds together sections of the suspended railroad's supporting structure.



Ron Bruns Joins Museum Board

Ronald E. (Ron) Bruns has been elected to the Board of Trustees for a two-year term. The son of a Burlington Northern engineer, Bruns was born in Lincoln, Nebraska. He moved to California in 1957 and took up residence in the Santa Barbara-Goleta area in 1968.

He worked for the Santa Barbara County Fire Dept. for 31-1/2 years, retiring in 2001 with the rank of Battalion Chief. Ron served two stints at Fire Station 14, next door to the railroad museum, in the early 1980s and again in the late 1990s. During his first years at Station 14, Ron witnessed the moving of Goleta Depot to Lake Los Carneros Park, the building's restoration/rehabilitation and rebirth, and the early years of the railroad museum.

He has a son and daughter and three grandchildren. Ron

and his wife, Sue, divide their time between a home in Goleta and the family ranch in the Lake

Hughes area of L.A. County.

Ron has been a museum member and volunteer for many years, serving regularly as a Goleta Short Line engineer-conductor. He is also a trustee on the Santa Barbara County Retirement Board and a volunteer with the Sedgewick Reserve in Santa Ynez.

New Display Shares Palmdale Depot Model



Goleta Depot's Waiting Room now has another new exhibit for visitors to enjoy. Entitled "Goleta Depot Had Many Sisters," the display, which is housed in a handsome case built by **Eugene Allen**, focuses on the 90+ Southern Pacific depots that were based on the same standard building plan known as the Combination Depot No. 22 design.

These two-story, wood-frame

country and town depots were built from about 1894 until the 1930s in six western states – California, Nevada, Arizona, Texas, Oregon, and Utah. Eight of these architectural look-alikes were in Santa Barbara County. Except for Goleta Depot, all of these Santa Barbara County depots were razed by the railroad, most before 1980.

The exhibit features a detailed scale model of the Palmdale, Calif. depot crafted by **Orlyn Glover**. Built in 1895, the Palmdale stationhouse was one of the first Combination Depot No. 22s erected by the S.P.
