Hop Aboard Easter Buppy Express April 11

Dust off those rabbit ears! It's time for another fun-filled *Easter Bunny Express* at the railroad museum. The museum's most popular springtime event celebrates its 17th anniversary on Saturday, April 11.

Those attending this year's event will be treated to a number of pleasant activities, each listed as a "station" on the special super-sized, egg-shaped tickets. Station stops include visits to Wabbit-Twacks Station (to ride the decorated trains on a one-third-mile-long course); Harvey's House (for a delicious cookie and lemonade); Easter-Bunnyville (to meet the Easter Bunny, where children will also receive an egg surprise); Jack-Rabbit Junction (to enter a prize drawing); and What's Up Dock (to collect another event souvenir).

The ticket cost is \$4 per person, adult or child. For those who will not be riding the miniature train, the cost is only \$2.

This year, we're adding something special: a second figure-8 ride, also one-third-mile long, which we're calling the "Lop-Ear Local." Ticketholders will be able to select which train they ride. Or, ride both trains for just \$2 more.

Event hours are 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. There will be Jack Rabbit Junction drawings held every hour, at 12 noon, 1:00, 2:00, 3:00, and 3:45 p.m.

Tickets are available in advance at the museum. They will also be sold during the event until 3:30 p.m.

For those who would like to have lunch or an afternoon snack, museum volunteers will be serving hot sandwiches, chips, and refreshments throughout the event. The 2009 Easter Bunny Express promises to be another "hare-raising egg-sperience" for the whole family. Hope to see you there! (rain date: April 18). The museum will be closed Easter Sunday, April 12.

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Super Saturday Special Trains

Super Saturday attendees were greeted with something new this year. Instead of the usual train ride, the Jan. 31 event featured **two** trains, operating on **two different routes!** A four-car train, headed by Engine No. 1316, hauled passengers on a six-minute ride around the museum grounds, while a two-car train, working out of the westside station and featuring Engine No. 2655, carried riders on a three-minute ride. Visitors could climb aboard either train as much as they liked during the busy Saturday afternoon, during which about 300 free rides were given.

Museum Reprises "National Train Day" Trip For 2nd Annual Event

Last year's rail trip to *National Train Day* was so popular that the museum is organizing another group trip for Saturday, May 9, when the 2nd annual *National Train Day* event will be held at Los Angeles Union Station.

Amtrak is promising that the 2009 event will offer even more attractions than last year's inaugural event: musical entertainment, rolling-stock tours, exhibits, VIP appearances, drawings for trips and other prizes, and plenty of souvenir giveaways.

The museum group, which will be led by Museum Director Gary Coombs and members of the museum's board of trustees, will travel aboard Amtrak's *Pacific Surfliner* trains. Group members will be able to choose their boarding location, selecting from Santa Barbara, Goleta, or Carpinteria.

The museum group will make use of two different southbound trains and two different northbound trains, allowing group members to choose between early and late departures and returns. Passengers can choose to ride to Los Angeles on either Train 768 (departing Santa Barbara at 6:45 a.m.) or Train 774, leaving Santa Barbara at 9:20 a.m. For the return home, passengers can ride either Train 775, leaving Los Angeles at 2:55 p.m., or Train 785, departing at 7 p.m.

Costs vary depending on the station selected. For example, the costs for a Santa Barbara passenger will be, for adults, \$43 (\$41 for museum members or seniors) and, for children age 2-15, \$27 (members, \$25). Goleta passengers will pay a few dollars more, Carpinteria riders slightly less.

Group members will have a lot to choose from during their time in Los Angeles, besides attending *National Train Day*. Historic Olvera Street and Chinatown are both within an easy walk of the train station, and several lines of the LA Metro Rail System also originate there. May 9 is also a free family day at the nearby Japanese American Museum, a special opportunity that many of our group members took advantage of during last year's *National Train Day* trip.

The museum is also planning to offer a limited itinerary of optional activities for those wishing to remain with other group members during parts of the day in Los Angeles.

New Guides-In-Training

Annual classroom training for the Trails & Rails Program was held on Feb. 25 and March 7. New additions to the program are Freda Hooper, Gladys Robinson, Tom Robinson, William Stancer, Doug Winter, Betty Wittwer, John Wittwer, Jack Yates, and Shirlie Yates. The next phase of their training will be aboard Amtrak's *Coast Starlight* trains, under the tutelage of the museum's senior guide-volunteers.

The Trails & Rails program is offered four days a week to passengers on the *Coast Starlight* between Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo. It includes a live presentation in which the guides share information, anecdotes, photographs, and other materials related to area history, local sights, natural history, and things -to-do along the train's route. Dur-

ing the summer months, one guide trip each week is extended north to the Bay Area.

Spring Fundraiser Needs Your Support!



Bruce is very active with his church, including service on church committees and as director of the handbell choir.

Many of his other interests revolve around trains, especially model railroading and the Southern Pacific Railroad. Bruce is actively involved with a number of railroad-related groups and organizations, including the South Coast Society of Model Engineers, the Southern Pacific Historical and Technical Society, and the Layout Design Special Inter-

est Group. He is a frequent presenter and session organizer at annual meetings and conventions.

Bruce has long been one of the museum's most active and versatile members. He joined the organization in 1992 and by 1995 was training to become a museum docent. Soon, Bruce

had acquired the skills and experience necessary to fill iust about all of the different volunteer jobs at the museum, including those of Goleta Short Line engineer and conductor, handcarride volunteer, and station agent. Bruce has also proven himself invaluable to the museum in many other ways, most notably by his

ability and willingness to help keep the trains of the modelrailroad exhibit in running order. Down through the years, Bruce has helped with special museum events, including thankless setup and cleanup activities, far too numerous to mention here.

Morden previously served on the Board of Trustees from 1999 to 2007. He was president in 2004.

Historic Safe Finds New, Goleta Depot Home

Museum Director **Gary Coombs** had been waiting a quarter-century for the phone call. Back in the early 1980s, an Amtrak representative had promised that the old safe at the



Santa Barbara train station would be donated to the museum, once a new safe had been acquired. Coombs knew this would be a major addition to the museum's collections – it was an original Southern Pacific Railroad safe and a close match to the S.P. safe that had occupied a special spot beneath the staircase in Goleta Depot's Freight Office during the mid-1900s.

Finally, last summer, **Carol Crego**, Amtrak's district manager of sta-

tions, called Gary to notify the museum that it could have the Santa Barbara safe. Moving the safe, which weighed many hundreds of pounds, would have to be the museum's responsibility, however.

Fortunately, the museum has had a good friend whenever heavy lifting has been needed. Back in 1986, **Specialty Crane & Rigging** helped move Caboose No 4023 from La Patera spur track to the museum grounds. Over the years, the same company had come to the museum's aid to install the wig-wag signal, the train-order board, and other large and

unwieldy pieces of equipment around the grounds. Owner **Seth Hammond** was happy to say yes again when Asst. Director **Phyllis Olsen** asked if Specialty Crane & Rigging could come to the rescue once more.

The safe was moved by one of Seth's crews on Nov. 18, the same date that Goleta Depot was moved 27 years earlier!

Hutchinson Family Donation Will Help Set New Free-Ride Mark

Thanks to a generous donation from the Hutchinson Family, the museum is able to offer our visitors more free-ride days during 2009 than in any previous year. The Hutchinsons — John, Carol Higgins, and their son, George — are sponsoring seven free-train-ride Saturdays, beginning on April 18, which is also a free handcar-ride day. The other Hutchinson-sponsored Saturdays are June 13, July 11, Aug. 8, Sept. 12, Oct. 10, and Nov 14.

Adding these to the free days that have already been scheduled brings the 2009 total to a record 81 free-ride days. That includes 58 free-train weekdays, under the *Free Ride Wednesday* program, sponsored by **Fairview Car Wash**, and *First Fridays Free*, which is made possible by the **Olitzky Family**.

The 2009 calendar also includes 12 days of free train rides on weekend days, including the Hutchinson-sponsored days, *Super Saturday* (held back on Jan. 31), and the approaching *Great Goleta Rail Race* (May 16; see page 3 story) and *Rotary Day* (June 20; see page 2) events, both of which also include free handcar rides. Free handcar rides are also given on the third Saturday of every month, thanks to the support of **Noel and Peggy Langle**.

The museum also sponsors *Free Rides For Moms*, on Mother's Day (Sunday, May 10) and *Free Rides For Dads*, on Father's Day (Sunday, June 21).
