GOLETA RAILROAD DAYS"

The museum is launching a new event this summer! You won't want to miss "*Goleta Railroad Days*," so be sure to mark the weekend of Aug. 1-2 on your calendar. The two-day event will incorporate all of the activities and attractions of past *Steaming Summer* events, while adding a lot more, including operating model train displays, live music, an "Unclaimed Freight & Baggage Sale," and lots of hands-on activities for young and old, alike.

Events hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days. Admission to the grounds is \$2, which includes all activities except rides, for which there will be an additional charge.

Speaking of rides, *Goleta Railroad Days* will feature two different train rides. On the 1/3-mile-long "Centennial Loop," two trains will be running, each pulled by a miniature steam-powered locomotive. There will also be a circus

train, hauled by the museum's own S.P. diesel switchers and featuring cars from the collection of **Ted Cheesman**, which will operate on the 1/6-mile-long "Westside Figure-8" track.

Rides on the museum handcar will also be available. In the interest of visitor safety, the museum's usual minimum-height requirements will be in effect: 34 inches for the train ride; 48 inches for the handcar.

The museum shared a booth at the event with the **National Park Service**, including the **Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail**, with whom we cooperatively present a "Trails & Rails" interpretive program for passengers aboard Amtrak's *Coast Starlight* trains.

A lot of indispensable volunteer work goes on behind the scenes. Retired UCSB painter **A.J. Medina** has given scores of hours recently, carefully laying the groundwork for giving Goleta Depot a much-needed new coat of paint.

Don Chalfant and Bruce Morden are also examples of behind-the-scenes work by museum volunteers. Don is doing a great job of caring for the equipment and supplies of the *Trails & Rails* program, which has included his giving classes on the use of the P.A. equipment. More recently, Bruce has taken on the responsibility for developing the materials that form the educational core of the Trails & Rails presentations that our volunteers make for passengers aboard the *Coast Starlight* trains.

Every week, usually on Wednesday morning, **Ed Leska** and his crew – **John Green** and **Tony Ramirez** – devote their time to maintenance and repair activities around the museum. More often than not, their efforts are devoted to the Goleta Short Line equipment and track, but they also find time to attend to other museum needs, from repairing a broken window or walkway light to fixing a handrail in the model-railroad exhibit.

The trio has also devoted much time to the operating G-gauge trains in the Visitor Center. Thanks to those efforts, a third train, running on its own separate track, has been entertaining museum visitors since June 4.

the Friends of the Santa Maria Valley Railroad, Coastal Rail Now (rail advocacy group), National Railroad Passenger Corp. (Amtrak), and RailPAC (Rail Passenger Assn. of Calif. & Nevada). Each will have a booth, with representatives available to answer questions, distribute literature, and share information with event attendees. There will also be an "Unclaimed Freight & Baggage Sale" – a name borrowed from the 1984 *Depot Day* event. Pick up some great bargains at this unique sale of used model-railroad supplies, railroad-theme magazines, toys, books, and other items. All proceeds benefit the museum.

There will be special afternoon guided tours of the historical landmark. We'll also be reopening the museum's Gandy Dancer Theater for *Goleta Railroad Days*. Railroad films will be screened throughout the event.

We'll have live musical entertainment, including performances by **Dixieland Daddies** on Saturday afternoon and the **Walk N Roll** barbershop quartet on Sunday.

Goleta Railroad Days will also offer plenty of opportunities for active participation by event attendees, including the following:

- Try your hand at the "Switching Puzzle," which challenges young and old to move the train successfully from one spot in the rail yard to another. Can you solve the puzzle?
- The "Children's Interactive Area" will feature George Hutchinson's wooden toy-train table (which was such a hit during the *Easter Bunny Express*) where everyone has a chance to "play trains."
- Take a turn at the computer-based train simulator, featuring **PI Engineering**'s state-of-the-art "RailDriver" cab controller (right).

Goleta Railroad Days will feature a number of visiting toy and model-train displays – representing all popular scales –



from pocket-sized "Z" scale (1:220) to large-scale garden-railways. To make these operating and static displays possible,

Walter Naumann will share his portable Z-scale trains. several local model railroad and toy-train clubs are partnering with the museum, including the **Coast Toy Train Club**, **South Coast Society of Model Engineers**, and **Gold Coast Garden Railway Society**.

Goleta Railroad Days will mark the first public showing of **Ken Kelley's** new scratch-built model of the Santa Barbara passenger station, which will form part of an O-gauge display filling Goleta Depot's Waiting



Room. The display will also include an operating S.P. Daylight passenger train, Kelley's model of Goleta Depot, and a yard filled with vintage O-gauge S.P. steam locomotives from the collections of Kelley and **Robert Sponsel**.



Don't miss the display of antique tinplate toy depots (left), also from the collection of Bob Sponsel. Covering the period 1918-1942, the display includes examples from three major American manufacturers of toy trains: Ives, American Flyer, and Lionel — companies that made both clockwork and electric trains.

Goleta Railroad Days will also feature an exhibition of operating live-steam equipment. Jim Marchiando's steam plant will be at center stage, powering a collection of steam whistles, a waterpump, and a table-top display of tools and toys (see above) assembled by Jim Higman, Gene Allen, and John

Green. Ask if you can toot one of the whistles.

Representatives from Goleta-based LaunchPoint Technologies will also be on hand during *Goleta Railroad Days*, to share the company's innovative uses of magnetic levitation

(maglev) transportation (see artist's concept at right).
