

# Caindy Caine Train

The South Coast Railroad Museum's much-anticipated year-end event, the *Candy Cane Train*, pulls out of the station the day after Thanksgiving, Friday, Nov. 27, to begin another holiday-season run. The *Candy Cane Train* continues daily through Dec. 24 (except on Nov. 30 and Dec. 1, 7-8, 14-15, when the museum will be closed). During Christmas week, the museum will be open two extra days — Monday & Tuesday, Dec. 21-22 — so that

the Candy Cane Train can make a few additional runs while local schools are out for their holiday breaks. The expanded Candy Cane Train schedule also means that train rides are available at the museum on Thursdays.

Visitors holding the festive *Candy Cane Train* souvenir tickets will receive a ride on the decorated train, with its distinctive redand-white candy-striped passenger cars, and an assortment of holiday treats and favors, including, of course, a candy cane.

Event hours are 1 to 4 p.m., including weekdays, but please plan to arrive not later than 3:30, in order to enjoy all of the *Candy Cane Train* activities without having to rush. You'll also want to budget time to enjoy the traditional *Toy Trains & Teddy Bears* display in the Waiting Room, which also opens Nov. 27.

Candy Cane Train tickets, at \$3.50 each, will be sold at the museum during event hours. Additional rides may be purchased for \$1.50 each. Museum members receive their usual 25¢ off on every ticket purchased.

For the safety of our guests, the usual 34-inch minimum-height requirement applies to all *Candy Cane Train* passengers.

#### Museum Moves To New Schedule

The museum will have a new schedule of operating days and hours starting Jan. 4. Wednesdays and Thursdays will be dropped, leaving a three-day, Fridaythru-Sunday, schedule. Hours on Fridays and Saturdays will be increased, with the museum opening at 11 and closing at 4 on those two days. Sunday hours will remain 1 to 4. Train rides will begin about 15 minutes after the museum opens each day.

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#### David Sanchez, Vincent Vanhecke Join Museum Board

David Sanchez and Vincent Vanhecke have joined the museum's Board of Trustees, each for two-vear terms.

Born in Belgium, Vincent Vanhecke has also lived in Singapore, England, and France. He and Lorraine, his wife of 20 years, have two children, Nicholas and Louisa. Vincent first became involved with the museum because of Nicholas' keen interest in trains and his volunteer activities at the museum. Vincent played an important role in Nicholas' recently-


David Sanchez was born in San Diego. He moved here in 1970 to teach in the Santa Barbara Elementary School District. Two years later, he moved to

His wife, Yolanda Lopez, is a retired elementary school teacher with 34 years of experience, all in Goleta. They have four children, two girls and twin boys, and four grandchildren.

David has a bachelor's degree in Physics, a master's in Education, and a Ph.D. in Educational Psychology.

His interest in trains and railroads goes all the way back to childhood, when the family home was within 100 feet of the tracks. Current projects include a train-themed tree fort for his grandchildren, and his own G-scale railroad.

# In Memoriam: Nancy P. Ried

The museum lost one of its dearest friends and faithful champions with the passing of **Nancy Ried** on Oct. 9. Nancy was especially active during the Goleta Depot Project, the campaign to save the landmark



building. She and her husband, **Walt**, were among the first, back in 1981, to become "Friends Of Goleta Depot," forerunner of today's railroad museum membership.

Nancy was one of only a handful of project faithful who walked the entire route during the wee hours of Nov. 19, 1981, when Goleta Depot was moved in two pieces from the tracks along Kellogg Ave. to its new home at Lake Los Carneros Park. Just a few hours later, that same morning, Nancy was back at the trackside site, alongside **Gene Allen** and **Mary Lou Williamson**, salvag-


ing, with shovel and trowel, foundation bricks that would be used in another depot project fundraiser.

Nancy and Mary Lou, and their **N&M Catering** partnership, made a long list of contributions to the depot project effort, including an unforgettable "Depot Surprise Trip" fundraising event in November 1982.

In 1984, Nancy and eight others received the "Golden Deed Award," then Goleta's highest community-service honor, for their many contributions to the Goleta Depot Project. She had been one of the most active members of the depot project's Fundraising Committee. She was added to the Goleta Depot Committee in 1983.

Nancy participated in the Spring Fundraiser for many years, going back to its earliest days as the "Asphalt Regatta." She still ranks as one of that event's most successful volunteer pledge-getters.

Nancy gave tours of Goleta Depot as one of the

museum's first docent volunteers. She also helped organize and staff many events during the 1980s, including the 1982 landmark dedication ceremony, a Depot Friends dinner in 1984, and the "Last Spike Ceremony" in October 1985, to name just a few.

Eventually, ill health forced Nancy to limit her active participation in museum events and affairs, but she and Walt continued faithfully as members and energetic supporters.

Whenever she was involved, Nancy brought with her a vitality, a comraderie, a sense of humor, and an unpredictable inventiveness that was her's alone.

There won't be another like Nancy Ried. She will be missed so much.

#### Depot Tree Shares A Railroad Tradition

The Goleta Depot tree will be lighted every night in December, for the enjoyment of travelers along Los Carneros Road as they pass the museum grounds during the holiday season.

The decorated tree, which can also be seen during daylight hours, occupies the historical landmark's second-floor window bay. It holds special Yuletide significance in preserving the custom, practiced over the years by countless rail-station agent families across America, of placing their Christmas tree so that its meaning could be shared with those on passing trains. The museum's tree is also decorated with small white "Remembrance Stars," each a memorial to a museum friend who has passed away.

## New Overland Trail Trip Set For Jan. 23

If you missed the museum's Nov. 7 adventure aboard the vintage rail car, *Overland Trail*, here's a second chance: The November trip was so popular that we've chartered this special car for another round-trip to San Luis Obispo on Saturday, Jan. 23.

Details are the same as for the first trip: Passengers will be able to board in either Santa Barbara or Goleta. The train is scheduled to depart Santa Barbara at 10:15 (10:27 for Goleta), arriving in San Luis Obispo at 12:45. We'll begin our return at 2 p.m., arriving in Goleta at 4:16, Santa Barbara at 4:31.

The Overland Trail is a 39-seat club lounge, built by the Pullman company for the Southern Pacific Railroad and delivered in 1949. Besides the chance to ride a special rail car, the trip is a perfect opportunity to enjoy the spectacular views and sites along this beautiful coastal portion of Amtrak's Pacific Coast route.

The cost is \$69 for museum members; \$75 for the general public. All proceeds benefit the museum.

Trip seating is limited. In fact, as this issue goes to press, over half of the Jan. 23rd seats have already been reserved. For information, or to make your reservations, call the museum today, 805/964-3540.
