"Candy Cane Train" Opens Nov. 25

The long-anticipated return of the *Candy Cane Train*, the beloved annual holiday-season event at the railroad museum, takes place on Friday, Nov. 25, the day after Thanksgiving. The event continues daily through Dec. 24, except for Nov. 28-29, Dec. 5-6, and Dec. 12-13, when the museum will be closed. The museum will again be open every day during the week before Christmas — including Mon. & Tues., Dec. 19-20 — when many local children are out of class for their schools' holiday breaks.

Holders of the oversized red *Candy Cane Train* souvenir tickets will receive a ride aboard the festively-decorated train, with its unique candy-striped cars. But that's not all! Each ticket is also good for an assortment of holiday treats and favors, including, of course, a yummy candy cane.



Holiday-decorated entry will welcome you.

Event hours are 1 to 4 p.m. on weekends, 2 to 4 on weekdays, but please be sure to arrive not later than 3:30 so you won't have to rush and can leisurely enjoy all of the *Candy Cane Train* activities (The last train will leave the station each day at 3:45!) Please also allow some time to enjoy the traditional *Toy Trains*

& Teddy Bears display (see page 4 story) in Goleta Depot's Waiting Room, which also opens on Nov. 25.

Candy Cane Train tickets, at \$4 each, can be purchased at the museum during event hours. You may also buy your tickets in advance, through the museum's online store, which will earn you a free second train ride with each ticket purchased (Save \$1.50 per ticket!). For the safety of our guests, the usual 34-inch minimum-height requirement applies to all *Candy Cane Train* passengers.

Museum Will Keep 5-Day Schedule

The museum will be closed to the public from Dec. 25 thru Jan. 4. When the museum reopens on January 5, it will be keeping the current 5-day schedule of Wednesday thru Sunday from 1 p.m. until 4.

The museum will also keep the shortened weekday Goleta Short Line trainride schedule that was started back in September, which has the first weekday train departing the station at 2 p.m. and the final train at 3:45. The wait between rides is not less than 35 minutes. Rides on weekends will still start at 1:15 p.m.

Free handcar rides will continue to be offered on the third Saturday of every month, thanks to **Noel and Peggy Langle**, who have generously renewed their sponsorship of this free-ride program.

Museum Makes Good Use Of Foundation Grant

The museum is currently finishing up extensive work on Goleta Depot's second-floor exterior. Using a \$5,000 grant from the **Santa Barbara Foundation**, the museum had scaffolding erected for over two months, allowing workers to perform structural repairs, remove woodpecker damage, re-install a section of fallen redwood gutter, and paint the entire second story. Finishing touches are now underway to install netting that will discourage future swallow nesting in the eaves.

The effort included more than 200 hours of volunteer labor, supplies donated by **Goleta Valley Paint**, and, finally, the donated use of a boom truck from **Specialty Crane & Rigging**.

Railroad Days/Depot Day Report

Combining Railroad Days and Depot Day this year over a single Sept. 17-18 weekend yielded a remarkable one-time event. We drew about 1,000 event-goers and gave more than 1,500 rides. That combines trains pulled by the museum diesels and Gene Allen's and Ed Winnewisser's steam locos, the museum handcar, and Bob Mahan's speeder. Helping give all those rides was a long list of additional engineers, conductors and handcar operators: Bob Burtness, Ken Kelley, Steve Kramer, Noel Langle, Bruce Morden, Tony Ramirez, Jamie Rosenberg, Lavonne Sanchez, Wes Taimuty, Roger Wells, Ann Winter, and Intern Kelsey Ulrich.

There have never been so many model trains at a museum event. This was due to the tremendous effort made by the museum's friends from the Gold Coast Garden Railway Society, the Coast Toy Train Club, and the South Coast Society of Model Engineers.

Members of the Woman's Service Club of Goleta almost single-handedly staffed three crucial event areas: Admissions, the Food Booth, and the Children's Interactive Area, which featured George Hutchinson's wooden toy trains and assists from both young George and his dad, John Hutchinson.

Storytimes were hosted by Children's Librarian Judy Savage, from Goleta Library, and Kathy Halloran.

2012 Rail Adventures

The museum is puting together another run of monthly one-day rail trips for 2012. All 12 will be

roundtrips from Santa Barbara/Goleta to San Luis Obispo.

The February 4, 2012 trip will be aboard the spectacular Vista Dome car, *Silver Splendor*. (See story & full-color photos of a museum-led 2011 *Silver Splendor* trip at http://goo.gl/Mcgor).

All other 2012 trips will be aboard the grand Southern Pacific club lounge, *Overland Trail*. Each *Overland Trail* trip is limited to a maximum of 36 passengers. The January and March trips are sold out.

Travel times for all trips are: Depart Santa Barbara (SB) at 10:15 a.m. (Goleta 10:27); Arrive San Luis Obispo (SLO) at 12:45 p.m.; Depart SLO at 2:00 p.m.; Arrive SB at 4:31 p.m. (Goleta 4:16).

Overland Trail tickets are \$55 for museum members, \$59 for the general public. The February 4th Silver Splendor trip is \$75 for museum members, \$79 for the general public. Soft drinks and light snacks are included with all trips.

New Fencing Adds Train-Area Security

The Wednesday morning work crew - Ed Leska, John Green, Tony Ramirez, and Doug Winter - have been busy making the fencing around the Goleta Short Line's Main Station boarding area more secure. They've been adding wooden pickets to the original post-and-rail fencing, to prevent young intruders from entering the station area without supervision. Most of the pickets have now been installed, leaving another 24 running feet plus the two gates to complete the project.

The Pullman-built *Overland Trail* was delivered in 1949. Originally designated *SP 2981*, the car served on the *San Francisco Overland* train.

Silver Spendor was built by the Budd Co. in 1956. Originally named Silver Buckle, she ran between Chicago and Denver on a daily basis until 1980, the last nine years under Amtrak's flag.

Depot Tree Marks Historic Traditions

When you visit the museum during the holiday season, or drive by on Los Carneros Road, be sure to watch for the decorated tree centered in the second-floor window bay.

The Goleta Depot tree will be lighted every night in December. It holds special significance in preserving the custom, practiced over the years by countless rail-station agent families across America, of prominently placing their Christmas tree so that it would be shared with those on passing trains.

The depot tree has also become a *museum* tradition – something that we've now done every year for three full decades, since 1982. Among its decorations are small white "Remembrance Stars" that each memorialize a museum friend who is no longer with us.

Display Shares Precious Keepsakes

Be sure to make this year's "Toy Trains and Teddy Bears!" display a part of your holiday visits to the railroad museum. The annual exhibition in Goleta Depot's Waiting Room features

stuffed animals and toy and model trains – all from the collections of the museum, its members, volunteers, and staff. The holiday exhibition opens Nov. 25 and continues through Dec. 24.
