We'll be celebrating the successful conclusion of another year at the museum with the triumphant return of the Candy Cane Train, an event that has been delighting local families, as well as holidayseason visitors, since 1993.

The much-anticipated year-end event opens on Friday, Nov. 28, the day after Thanksgiving. It will continue daily through Christmas Eve, except for Dec. 1-3, 8-10, and 15-17, when the museum is closed. The museum will be open three extra days — Dec. 22-24 — when local children are home for the holidays.

Those holding the oversized red and green Candy Cane Train souvenir tickets, will be able to enjoy a number of fun and festive activities, including a ride aboard the decorated train and an assortment of holiday treats and favors, including, of course, a delicious cherry-flavored candy cane.

Event hours are 1 to 4 p.m. on

weekends and 2 to 4 on weekdays, but please plan to arrive before 3:30 to allow enough time to leisurely enjoy all Candy Cane Train activities. (Each day, the last train will depart the station promptly at 3:45) Please allow extra time to enjoy the traditional Toy Trains & Teddy Bears display in Goleta Depot's Waiting Room, which also opens Nov. 28 (see page 2 story).

Candy Cane Train tickets are \$4 each and can be purchased at the museum during event hours. You may also buy your tickets in advance, through the museum's online store, which will earn you a free second train ride with each ticket purchased (a savings of \$1.50 per ticket). For the safety of our guests, the museum's standard 34-inch minimumheight requirement applies to all Candy Cane Train passengers.

Volunteers Make Museum's Biggest Day Possible

Museum Will Expand Trails & Rails Program In 2015

Our museum will be expanding the San Jose component of its Trails & Rails program on an exploratory basis in 2015. As part of this test, the museum is now recruiting volunteers from the greater San Jose area to join the museum's current cadre of about two dozen volunteers who live in Santa Barbara and Ventura counties. On Dec. 7-9, Museum Director Gary Coombs will be traveling to San Jose to conduct an orientation for prospective volunteer guides there.

The museum's Trails & Rails guides ride Amtrak's Coast Starlight, giving informative program presentations to the passengers aboard these trains. Some guide trips consist of one-day roundtrips from Santa Barbara to San Luis Obispo. Others involve overnight excursions to San Jose.

San Jose area residents who are selected to become Trails & Rails guides will undergo a full day of classroom training, followed by onboard training under the guidance of the museum's senior volunteer guides. On completion of their training, the new San Josebased guides will begin making one-day presentation roundtrips on the Coast Starlight from their home station to San Luis Obispo.
